Mrs. Hornbeck was totally blind for eight years, but bore her affliction patiently and loved to visit with her friends and neighbors of pioneer days. She was a member of the Methodist church.

Funeral services will be held at the graveside in the Pankey cemetery, Sams Valley, with Rev. D. E. Millard officiating. Arrangements are in care of Conger funeral parlors.

GOVERNORS GIVEN BIDS FOR ANNUAL DRAMA FESTIVAL

Formal invitations to attend the sixth annual Shakespearean plays in Ashland this August were sent to three western governors today.

Letters have been dispatched to Charles A. Sprague, of Oregon, Clarence D. Martin, Washington, and Culbert L. Olsen, of California, along with additional invitations to prominent state officials and educational chieftains. Governor Sprague heads the Shakespearean association as honorary president, while other honorary members include Senator Charles L. McNary, ex-Governor Charles H. Martin, former president Herbert Hoover, Secretary of State Earl Snell.

Also included as honorary members are Dr. Fredrick Hunter, chancellor, state system of higher education; Dr. C. A. Howard, president, Oregon College of Education; George W. Peavy, president, Oregon state college; Donald M. Erb, president, University of Oregon; Bruce Baxter, president, Willamette university; Joseph K. Carson, mayor of Portland; Willard L. Marks, president of the state board of higher education; Dr. George Larkin and Bert Hawkins.

Meanwhile on the production front, Director William David Cottrell reports that rehearsals are progressing satisfactorily and that the casts are becoming familiar with their roles. Rehearsals have been scheduled daily for the next 10 weeks while dress rehearsals will start the forepart of July.
