

MARION CO. TOWNS GAIN POPULATION

Salem, June 14.—(P)—Silverton and Woodburn, Marion county's second and third cities, have gained in population the past 10 years, A. R. McCall, district census supervisor, announced today.

Silverton totaled 2925 compared with 2462 in 1930 and Woodburn jumped from 1675 to 1981.

Other figures, the 1940 total being listed first: Stayton, 1066, 797; Hubbard 387, 330; Gervais 332, 254; Mount Angel 1116, 979; Jefferson 415, 591.

WEATHER IS IDEAL FOR EXCURSIONS TO FOREST AREAS

All Rogue National Camps Are Now Ready for Use—Fishing Is at Peak

The following recreational bulletin was issued today by Rogue River national forest headquarters:

"Ideal weather conditions, with dense shade offering cool restfulness, prevail in the Rogue River national forest."

"In the Union Creek ranger district, fishing is approaching the peak. Streams yielding good catches include Flat, Foster, Muir, National, Crater, Copeland, and Bybee creek."

"Swimming Popular—Camps throughout the forest have been made ready for use. Swimming is becoming very popular in the Applegate district, while cool shade and many wild flowers are the main attractions at the higher elevations."

"Good catches of eastern brook trout are being made at Fish lake, mostly by still fishing. Fourmile lake has been only fair, with both rainbow and silverside trout being taken."

"Serious fire conditions are prevailing earlier than usual this year. Constant vigilance on the part of forest users will be necessary if we are to avoid heavy losses of our natural resources through forest fires."

the national forest fishing is reported as excellent, particularly in the vicinity of the Elks picnic grounds and Happy camp. The best flies are march brown, red upright, royal coachman and flying caddis.

"The trail to Seven Lakes basin is now open, with very little snow on the summit. It is probably a little early for good fishing in these lakes and the mosquitoes are pretty bad there now."

"All roads in the forest are now open except the Ashland loop, which is closed with snow at Wrangle Gap from the Applegate side and at Bull Gap from Ashland. Maintenance crews are working on this road now and it should be open in a week or two."

"Swimming Popular—Camps throughout the forest have been made ready for use. Swimming is becoming very popular in the Applegate district, while cool shade and many wild flowers are the main attractions at the higher elevations."

"In the Rogue river outside Fishing in Applegate—'Squaw lake has been yielding good catches. Some catches are also being made in the main Applegate river."

PILOT STUDENTS OFFERED COURSE WITHOUT CHARGE

Southern Oregon College of Education to Enroll Trainees Without Usual Fee

Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland, June 14.—(Sp.)—There are still a few positions open for applicants interested in Civilian Pilot Training at the Southern Oregon College of Education, according to Marshall E. Woodell, director of pilot training.

However, requirements as set by the civilian aeronautics authority stipulate that individuals must have received scholastic credit for at least one year of college work during the scholastic year of 1939-40, or possess a degree or graduation certificate from some college or junior college, or they must have received scholastic credit for at least two years of work in some institution of higher learning.

All students interested, who believe that they are qualified, should call at the college administrative offices as soon as possible.

ASHES DUMPED NEAR IVY STREET GARAGE CAUSE MORNING FIRE

Fire early this morning damaged the side and roof of the frame garage at the Joseph V. Mendrala residence, 304 South Ivy street. Damage was small, Chief Roy Elliott said.

Chief Elliott reported that the fire was caused by hot ashes that had been piled up against the garage on the alley side. The live ashes, he said, after smoldering for some time, ignited the side of the garage. There was no one at home when the fire occurred, the chief stated, a neighbor reporting the blaze. Firemen answered a ward alarm at 5:44 a. m.

It was the second fire in two days attributed to hot ashes. On Wednesday night hot ashes were recorded as the cause of a grass fire at 716 West Jackson boulevard.

The chief warned residents to put ashes in metal containers or to wet them down until they were entirely out. He counseled that if care is not used, there is liable to be another epidemic of fires caused by hot ashes.

BEAUTY OPERATOR KNIFED TO DEATH

Newcastle, Pa., June 14.—(P)—An attractive beauty operator was horribly slashed and beaten to death early today just outside the city.

Sheriff M. M. Inghram said two youths found the body of Helen Nasal, about 28, near a beer parlor and added: "It looks as though she might have been a victim of jealousy. We have a good suspect in mind."

Stab wounds as deep as four to six inches covered the body. One gash between the left shoulder and hip penetrated the lung and heart, causing death.
