

CAMPBELL RESIGNS AS AIDE TO VAN WINKLE

Salem, June 14.—(P)—Assistant Attorney General Ralph Campbell, attorney for the state unemployment compensation commission since its inception four years ago, resigned today to enter private law practice in Salem.

Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle appointed H. L. Lister, now attorney for the state industrial accident commission, to succeed Campbell. C. L. Mars-

ters, Newport attorney, was named to succeed Lister.

KIDNAPER WALEY IS DENIED HABEAS CORPUS

San Francisco, June 14.—(P)—Harmon M. Waley, kidnaper of George Weyerhaeuser, Tacoma lumber family heir, lost his habeas corpus plea in the federal circuit court of appeals yesterday. As a result, the Alcatraz convict must remain in prison to serve his life term.

Waley contended that his conviction under the so-called Lindbergh law was invalid because he did not cross a state line during the commission of the crime.

SCOTT FAR AHEAD IN PRIMARY VOTE IS FINAL REPORT

State Treasurer Candidate Received Almost As Many As Total of 2 Opponents

Salem, June 14.—(P)—The official canvass of votes in the May 17 primary election showed today that Leslie M. Scott, republican nominee for state treasurer, received about the same number of votes as both his opponents.

Scott's total was 75,231, compared with 51,499 for Earl Hill and 24,134 for Floyd J. Cook. A. L. Brown, democratic nominee for state treasurer, received 60,501 votes, while Lyman Ross, his opponent, got 48,751.

A meeting of the executive board of the Jackson County Public Health association has been called in her honor, Mrs. J. C. S. Weills, president, announced today. Members of the board are invited to the country home of Mrs. Alex Sparrow for 3 p. m. Thursday. Miss Withen will come to Medford directly from Klamath Falls and will continue to Grants Pass the same day.

Annual report for the association year 1939-40, released by the executive board of the health association, reads as follows:

The executive board reports that during the past year it has conducted:

- 1. Eleven monthly board meetings, with a 96 per cent attendance.
2. Five general meetings, for the full county membership with a business session, address by guest speaker, tea served, once each by a committee from Central Point, Jacksonville, Phoenix, Talent. The annual luncheon is given under auspices of Ashland and Medford.
3. Sent a delegate to the National Tuberculosis association annual meeting, Boston.
4. Sent 14 delegates to Oregon's annual meeting at Bend.
5. Held a regional Christmas seal conference in Medford.
6. Helped the rehabilitation of three patients, dismissed from tuberculosis institutions.
7. Financed 232 tuberculosis X-rays.
8. Supplied nearly 2000 quarts of milk to tuberculosis suspects.
9. Financed the upkeep of three health houses.

About 125 library and text books have been repaired for another year of service in the school library.

MARISCHINO CHERRY RECIPE

4 1/2 lbs. Royal Ann Cherries 4 1/2 lbs. sugar Juice of 1 lemon 1 oz. Schilling Liquid Red Food color 1 oz. Schilling Almond Extract Pit cherries.
