LOOKOUTS, GUARDS ARE ASSIGNED TO APPLAGATE POSTS

Big Applegate, June 15—(Spl.)—By June 25th every member of the summer fire personnel of the Applegate district will be at his mountain post, it was announced from the Star Ranger station. Dutchman's Peak lookout will continue to send daily meteorological reports to the local ranger station, where reports from other district rangers of the Rogue River national forest are assembled and telephoned in code to the United States weather bureau in Portland each day. New phases in compiling the reports are requested this year, it was said.

Fireguards, located in canyons where they will be called upon to fight fires if necessary include John Harr of the community at Perk's pasture; Joseph J. Jones of Medford at Wagner Gap; Payne Straw at Little Applegate; Carl Ehelebe, Ashland; John Byrne of the community at Thompson creek; Douglas Finch of Medford at Hutton; Herbert Pennings, Los Angeles college student, at Sturges; Morris Byrne of the community at Fir Glades.

Finch, Dowell and Morris Byrne will be accompanied by their wives. Jack Crump and Albert Young of the community will be on duty at the ranger station. Mt. Ashland, ordinarily an emergency lookout, will not be manned at the present. A number of the men are employed in trail maintenance before going on fire duty.

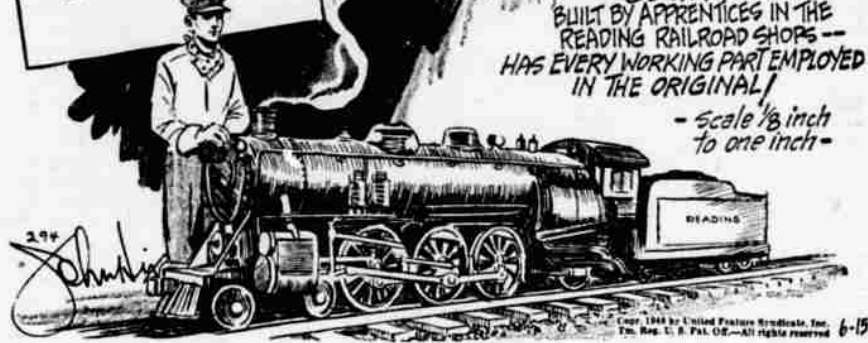
