SABOTAGE SEEN IN CANADA SHIPMENT

Sarnia, Ont., June 17.—(P)—Police investigators of Canada and the United States considered today the possibility that a fire set in a box car carrying airplane motors across the international border was an attempt to blow up the railway tunnel beneath the St. Clair river between Port Huron, Mich., and Sarnia. The fire was set late Saturday in a car carrying four motors consigned from a Montana plant to the Fleet Aircraft corporation at Fort Erie, Ont. A railway guard discovered the blaze which was extinguished without damage. Three hours earlier, a 10 or 12 car train carrying what were described as "bomb parts" traveled through the same tunnel. That train also came from Montana. Police were considering the possibility that the person who set the fire had intended to set the earlier train ablaze.

Grants Pass, Ore., June 17.—(P)—State and federal officers today were questioning Dolie McGinnis, Portland, waitress, recently employed at Trinidad, Cal., and Chris Evangelinos and J. H. Stewart of Trinidad, Sheriff A. Donley Barnes said. The three were held on open charges. Barnes said the woman, blonde and 23, alleged that she was forcibly placed in Stewart's car here Saturday by Evangelinos and was driven to the California state line on the Redwood highway. She sought and received protection from Kleibert Gautreaux and E. G. Gardner at the Rendezvous, a California state line tavern, she said. The sheriff reported the woman was bruised about her neck. He gave Stewart's age as 35 and Evangelinos' as 43. He said Evangelinos was the woman's employer in a Trinidad restaurant and that she said she hitchhiked here. District Attorney Orval J. 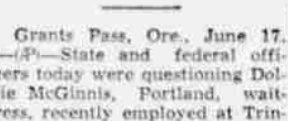
