Rotarians and guests heard him discuss various phases of the motor transport industry and general highway transportation throughout the west in relation to national defense.

As western representative of the National Highway Users' conference, Mr. Springer has contributed much toward removal of highway barriers between states as pertaining to highway transportation and has worked unceasingly in the interest of uniformity of state laws regulating highway use.

Because of his service in general public relations and long study of problems affecting highway transportation, Mr. Springer's talk was especially enlightening. The importance of western highways in this nation's defense program was stressed by the speaker.
