OREGON METHODISM SHOWS PROGRESS IN CHURCHES, FINANCE

Portland, June 20.—(P)—Oregon Methodism increased its churches, reduced indebtedness and expanded membership in the past 12 months, the Rev. H. S. Shellhart of Corvallis told the denomination's general state conference last night.

The Rev. Shellhart, conference statistician, explained that the addition of new churches was due primarily to the recent merger of the Methodist Episcopal and the Methodist Episcopal South churches and the "general deepening of spiritual feeling."

Churches in the Cascade district reported 7600 members in 1939 compared with 8458 this year.

Bishop William G. Martin of Omaha, presiding officer, told the churchmen's forum yesterday "there is an ultimate justice before the bar, of which individuals and nations alike shall stand; there is a force in this world that is personal; our hope is in God."

He said he did not believe the world "is to become the pawn of a type of dictatorship that robs man of his right to think and to act."
