

PARISIANS BITTER AGAINST REYNAUD UNDER NAZI RULE

Rightest Le Matin and Semi-Fascist Victorie Allowed to Resume Publication

By Robert Okin. Paris, June 18.—(Delayed)—By courier to Aachen and telephone to Berlin—Paris is beginning a new life under German occupation as public services resume operation and some phases of the fallen capital's daily activity return to normal.

Current opinion as expressed now is strongly rightist, and bitter against former Premier Paul Reynaud, who resigned Sunday as the government prepared to seek a peace, and against Edouard Daladier, who was premier when France declared war against Germany.

The two principal organs of opinion allowed to resume publication are rightist newspaper Le Matin and the semi-fascist Victorie.

Ex-Residents Now Rule. Three German officials who knew Paris before the war are now in important posts of the occupying forces.

Postal services were restored today in the Paris department of Seine and it was announced that the Comedie Francaise, the famous state theater, will resume Saturday.

Uniformed postmen delivered the first mail Parisians have received in many days. Outgoing mail services were again functioning and the local telephone never was interrupted by the occupation.

Telegraph facilities, at least within the area occupied by Germany, were expected to reopen shortly.

Slow-Up in Defense Feared If Profit Limit Is Decried

Washington, June 20.—(AP)—Representatives of President Roosevelt's national defense commission were reported today to have told the senate naval committee that a committee-approved plan to limit profits of airplane manufacturers and shipbuilders to 7 percent might slow up defense construction.

Chairman Walsh (D., Mass.) said commission representatives, including Capt. Sidney Kraus, were "pressed hard" by committee members in secret session about what attitude business was likely to take about "forgetting the profit incentive during the emergency period."

Walsh said the gist of the resulting testimony was that the defense commission feared that manufacturers would not be "pre-disposed to cooperate" in speeding up plant expansion and defense production if present profits were reduced.

Under existing laws, the treasury claims all but 12 percent of net profits on airplanes manufactured for the government and 10 percent on ships. The committee amended a bill last week to fix the profit limitations for both at 7 percent.

Senator Holt (D., W. Va.) told reporters when he came out of the closed committee meeting that he and other members were "determined to get at the bottom" of what he described as an effort to obtain large profits on defense construction work.

The chairman made public the following table which he said indicated the operating net profit made by 10 aircraft and ship concerns on all of their business in 1938 and 1939:
