

### FRENCH RETURNING TO BORDEAUX WITH DICTATORS' TERMS

(Continued from page One.)

—lending credence to unconfirmed reports that France has learned the gist of the axis terms, found them too harsh for the nation's honor, and resolved to fight on.

These reports said President Lebrun and members of his government were ready to flee to Algiers, North Africa, to carry on the war from there, even if German troops capture all France.

**Nazis Slowing Up**

The French admitted nazi troops have occupied Lyon, rich industrial city, 200 miles south of Paris, but dispatches from Geneva simultaneously gave the first hint that the German mechanized machine has begun to wear out and falter.

Refugees reaching Geneva from the battle zone told of seeing quantities of abandoned German tanks, armored cars and motorcycles along the main highways.

Nazi motorcycle troops were also reported scouring the countryside in search of needed gasoline supplies.

Nevertheless, under dwindling French resistance, Hitler's armies swept further down into France, the high command announced.

Brest, French Atlantic port below Cherbourg, where the American expeditionary force landed tens of thousands of men in 1917, fell to the nazi columns, the official communique said.

Other German troops racing down toward Bordeaux crossed the lower Loire river—France's intended new line of defense if the fight goes on—between Nantes and Tour.

German warplanes bombed the refugee-swollen temporary capital of Bordeaux four times during the night, killing or wounding 60 persons.

In Germany, the watchword was "England is next." The Berlin press sounded warnings to Britain in comments on British attacks on western Germany.

Voelkischer Beobachter, Hitler's newspaper, in discussing British plans for local defense volunteers, declared "a sniper war" apparently was being organized, and that Germany uses "brutal hardness" in dealing with "snipers."

### 400 WOMEN NOW MAKING CLOTHES FOR WAR VICTIMS

Approximately 400 women of the valley are now engaged in sewing and knitting garments for war refugees under the Jackson county war relief production committee, of which Mrs. Alfred S. V. Carpenter is chairman.

Mrs. E. G. Burgess, in charge of the knitting and sewing, announced yesterday that despite the large number of women devoting their time to making garments, more women are needed.

Deadline for the quota is September 1. Materials and instructions may be obtained at the Red Cross office in the county courthouse.

Mrs. Carpenter received a letter yesterday from Red Cross national headquarters lauding the local war relief committee for its splendid work.

The letter, signed by Mrs. Dwight Davis, assistant director, Red Cross volunteer service, reads, in part: "I want to tell you how enthusiastic we of the National Volunteer service are about the magnificent work which your chapter has been doing. I wish the members of

your chapter could read the appreciative letters which are being received here from Europe. The needs in Europe today are greater than ever before. Refugees are pouring into England and France with nothing except the clothes on their backs. Each article receives some special praise from one of the foreign Red Cross societies."

Knitters here number 100 and about 300 are sewing. Due to the large quota for this county, a second appeal has been made by the committee for more help.
