

FISH HATCHERY TO RESTOCK ROGUE IN G. PASS PROPOSAL

Sportsmen Would Re-establish Hatchery On Wetherbee Place On Applegate

Grants Pass, June 21.—(Sp) A plan whereby Josephine county can restock the Rogue river and all lakes and streams within the county boundaries is being considered by Grants Pass sportsmen.

Their plan is to re-establish the fish hatchery at Guy Wetherbee's place on Applegate river for the sole use of restocking rivers and lakes of Josephine county. They want to secure 20 percent of total fishing license receipts turned into the state from this county for operating expense.

First, the Rogue river would be seeded of all carp and suckers this summer when the water is low. Then at the proper time fish from the hatchery would be liberated below the Savage Rapids dam, so that none could swim out into the irrigation ditches. Fish would be liberated as far down the river as possible. Above the dam there are many irrigation systems to trap fish.

A. J. Burbee, one of the investigators of the plan, reported the hatchery has been pretty well preserved since it went out of use about nine years ago.

Wetherbee would be given full charge of the hatchery, Burbee said. He has had long experience in this work.

The 50,000 rainbow trout planted here last fall have stayed within about a half-mile radius of where they were liberated and are about nine inches in length. Numerous catches of this fish have been reported, and the planting was a success, Burbee added.

BUDYANCY FEATURES RETAIL TRADE WEEK THIRD TIME IN ROW

New York, June 21.—(P)—Buyout retail sales marked shopping in the nation's retail stores this week for the third weekly period in a row, Dun & Bradstreet reported today.

Sales for the country as a whole averaged 6 to 11 percent above last year, the credit agency said.

While gift sales for June weddings and school and college graduations attracted heavy buying, there was a strong undertone in staple items also, with heavy turnover in annual clearances of rugs and other floor coverings.

"Buying of men's wear, often considered a barometer of consumer sentiment, moved well. Refrigerators were said to be in less demand than a month ago, but ranges and small appliances continued active, and some stores said the slump early in May had been more than overcome."

Wholesale trade also expanded, with increased inquiries for metal toys, housewares, liquors, women goods, and staple dry goods.

AIRCRAFT CARRIER CONSTRUCTION JOB GIVEN TO NORFOLK

Sixty Million Dollar Ship Scheduled to Be Finished Within 48 Months

Washington, June 21.—(P)—The navy announced today that its own yard at Norfolk, Va., had been designated to build a 25,000-ton aircraft carrier, the ninth such vessel for the United States fleet.

The carrier, planned to carry around 100 planes, is expected to cost more than \$60,000,000. Navy officials estimated the construction cost would be \$48,000,000 without armor, armament and ammunition.

Funds for the new carrier were provided in the annual navy appropriation bill approved by President Roosevelt last week.

Construction of 22 other warships provided for in that measure, and which are to cost approximately \$350,000,000, was assigned within a few hours after Mr. Roosevelt signed the appropriation.

The navy said work on the new vessels would start immediately and was expected to be finished within 48 months.

"The annual assessment period commences at noon on the first day of July succeeding the date of location. The right of possession to a valid mining claim is maintained by the expenditure of at least \$100 in labor or improvements of a mining nature on the claim."

"The annual assessment period 1939-1940 ends at noon July 1, 1939. If a mining claim has been located prior to July 1, 1939, in order to maintain the right of possession, annual assessment work must be done for the period 1939-1940, and must be started some time prior to noon of July 1, 1940."

"If the work is not completed by noon of July 1, 1940, work must be continued with reasonable diligence until it is completed. The term 'reasonable diligence' implies that work should be continued to completion, without any undue interruptions. Failure to perform the assessment work for any year will subject the claim to relocation unless work for the benefit of the claim is resumed before a relocation is made."

"Oregon statutes require that an affidavit of annual labor or improvements upon a mining claim be recorded in the mining records of the county in which the mining claim is situated, within 30 days after the performance of such labor or making of such improvements."

Ashland, June 21.—(Sp)—Boy Scouts, working under chamber of commerce sponsorship, discovered 33 additional Ashlanders to tally on census sheets. The boys have completed their double-check.

However, if any citizens still have not been enumerated, a call to the chamber office will bring an enumerator to get brief statistics, C. M. Litwiler, chamber president, said today.

The 33 names, plus 25 which volunteered at an earlier chamber of commerce call, made nearly 60 missed by first census check. Total population, after enumeration details, probably will put Ashland up to the 4,650 mark.

"Under the circumstances, our recent findings indicate that the census was accurately taken and the omissions only natural by percentage," Litwiler said today.

Miners need not complete their assessment work for the 1939-40 year by this July 1 provided they have begun it prior to noon of that day and continue it "with reasonable diligence until it is completed," according to the Ore-Bin, publication of the state department of geology and mineral industries, which interprets the Oregon law as follows:
