WOODEN BOX USE CITED AS AIDING COAST PAYROLLS

Russell Downs of Klamath Falls, regional director of wooden box promotion, today cited increased employment and increased payrolls as the two principal reasons why wholehearted support should be given the wooden box industry. National Wooden Box Week opened Monday and will be observed through Saturday.

Downs requested that grocers ask their wholesalers to ship as much and as many different

kinds of food as possible in wooden boxes, in order that "help may be given to one of the largest and most important industries in the west."

It was pointed out that there are 250 factories in the nation turning out saw-nailed containers. This, Downs explained, was but a small part of the wooden box container industry, which includes the making of wire-bound boxes, veneer crates, wooden baskets, hampers, tubs and drums. The saw-nailed containers utilize the pine lumber of this territory, and therefore are our particular interest, he stated. About one-fifth of the two billion feet of lumber used for this type of container is Ponderosa pine, he said.

Downs told of the vital importance of the industry to the sector, explaining that the more wooden boxes used the larger


the payrolls and the more men employed.
