

NORTHWEST GROUP SEES THIRD TERM MOVE IN MAKING

Philadelphia, June 22.—(AP)—The advance contingent of delegates, Oregon and Idaho delegates arrived at the Republican national convention site today viewing President Roosevelt's Republican cabinet appointments as a "definite tip-off" the president will run for a third term.

"The only purpose of this coalition move is a last minute attempt to save the new deal and the third term program," said Ralph Horr of Seattle, speaking for the delegation as temporary chairman of the traveling group. Horr was elected to head informal caucuses aboard the train on motion of Phil Metschan of Portland.

"This is a step by the president to establish a form of dictatorship and perpetuate the power of the new deal," Horr added.

"There is no emergency except the fact the new deal is in danger."

Other members of the group voted to send Horr's statement to the convention in resolution form.

About 11 Washington votes for Thomas Dewey were forecast, with the other seven votes scattered, but observers felt that if there should be a solid vote, it would be for Dewey only.

Idaho's eight votes are instructed for Dewey and Oregon's 10 for Sen. Charles McNary but Delegates Norblad and Farrell said it was likely the Oregonians would switch to Wendell Willkie on the second ballot.

SEN. GLASS WEDS VIRGINIA WIDOW

Washington, June 22.—(AP)—Senator Carter Glass of Virginia and Mrs. Mary Scott Meade of Amherst, Va., were married at Amherst at 4:30 p. m. (EST) today.

The wedding was a quiet ceremony at Ascension Episcopal church. The Reverend Barney Phillips, rector of Epiphany Episcopal church at Washington, who has for years been chaplain of the United States senate, officiated, assisted by the Rev. John Wellford, rector of Ascension church.

After the marriage Senator and Mrs. Glass left Amherst for the senator's country estate, "Montview," near Lynchburg, being compelled by the senator's recent illness to postpone a contemplated wedding trip to Lake George.

Senator Glass is 82 years old and Mrs. Glass is 50 years of age. He has been married once before. His first wife died about three years ago.

DENTISTS OPPOSE COMPULSORY RULE

Portland, June 22.—(AP)—Compulsory health insurance is "unalterably opposed" by the American Dental Association, Dr. Wilfred H. Robinson, Oakland, Cal., said yesterday.

"The association has given its approval, however, to setting up voluntary health insurance systems to provide protection against the costs incurred by dental diseases," Dr. Robinson, president-elect of the national body, told the Oregon Dental association.

Dr. Neil Zimmerman, Portland, was named president-elect of the Oregon group, and Dr. S. C. Robinson, Portland, was automatically elevated to president.

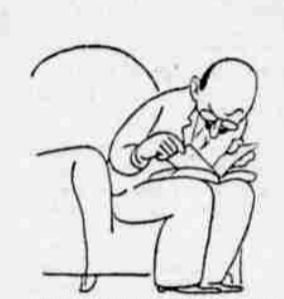
