

TRAFFIC RECORD ESTABLISHED AT LOCAL AIRPORT

262 Passengers Boarded United Planes, 226 Arrived in June—May Next

A new travel record here was established in June by United Air Lines. At the same time a new record was established for the number of United planes stopping at Medford municipal airport.

Last month 207 United planes called here. A tabulation today showed that 262 passengers boarded planes here and 226 got off, a total local traffic record of 488 passengers.

The previous record was established in May when 215 passengers got on and 206 got off United planes at the municipal airport, a total of 421.

In all, 327 planes utilized the municipal airport in June, it was shown by a monthly report submitted to the city council last night by Thomas A. Culbertson, Jr., airport superintendent.

In addition to United's 207, the planes were classified as follows: 63 U. S. army, 42 private, 8 U. S. navy and 7 national guard.

Mr. Culbertson also informed the council that the new class of student pilots had been started at the airport. The civilian pilot training program is being carried out under the government's expanded defense plan. The quota allotted to this district being 30 students. The quota for the first class, which has been completed, was ten students. The course of study is carried out at the Southern Oregon College of Education in Ashland and the Medford municipal airport.

Natural Winds May Be Turned Into Melodies

Amarillo, Tex. —(AP)—The whistling winds that pump water for the cattle industry of the Texas Panhandle some day may produce natural music as aesthetic as a Strauss waltz. Those same near-constant winds are believed capable of producing natural plains music or Beethoven sonatas in a gigantic "wind organ."

This "wind organ" was planned for the cut-up country of beautiful Palo Duro canyon, 25 miles southeast of here.

The idea of capturing the music of the plains wind was originated several years ago and developed by Guy A. Carlander, Amarillo architect, until it is now known to be an engineering possibility.

The wind instrument would be built in the form of a small memorial dug into the side of the cliff of the canyon. In the wall, which would be the cliff wall, slender opening would be cut to utilize the winds and drafts of the canyon.

Wind would play upon the instrument for both controlled and uncontrolled sound music. It could furnish power to play recorded pieces or left uncontrolled to produce its own natural melody.

The wind produces, under certain conditions when loosed against proper furniture, sails, reeds and hollow tubes, noises which are interesting, weird, fantastic, and at times beautiful in composition and sound, the originator said.

BERKELEY WAY MAIN ASSESSMENTS FIXED BY COUNCIL ACTION

An ordinance providing for the assessment of the cost of the Berkeley Way water main was adopted by the city council at its regular semi-monthly meeting last night.

The ordinance specified the levies to be assessed against each parcel of property benefited by the improvement. Total cost to be assessed was \$1115. The water main was completed in the spring.

The June work report submitted by Fred W. Scheffel, city superintendent, showed that improvements in Bear Creek and Prescott parks were continued last month. The report summarized the work done by all city departments last month.

The meeting was adjourned to 7:30 p. m. July 9, when an informal conference is to be held with property owners who have petitioned for certain street improvements.

Councilmen H. S. Deuel and J. Frank Reinhart were absent.

\$3,612,055.036 YEAR'S DEFICIT

Washington, July 3. —(AP)—The United States wound up the fiscal year which ended June 30 with a net deficit of exactly \$3,612,055.036.71.

The figure announced today by the treasury, excludes money spent to retire debts.

The government took in a total of \$5,924,836,402.76 during the year and spent \$9,666,085,339.47.

Receipts were \$257,000,000 higher than in the 1939 fiscal year but the expenditures were \$327,000,000 greater.

SCHARNHORST HIT IN BOMBING RAID

London, July 3. —(AP)—The air ministry announced tonight that British planes which attacked the Kiel canal last night heavily bombed the German battleship Scharnhorst as she lay in a floating dock.

The battleship was said to have been undergoing repairs.

Four direct hits on the Scharnhorst and on the deck were claimed by one plane, and another reported it had dropped three bombs from 2,000 which burst in a row across the battleship and started a fire.

GERMANS ALLEGE BRITAIN PLOTTED ON MANY FRONTS

Entangling of Scandinavia, Rumania, Turkey, Greece and Yugoslavia Held Aim

Berlin, July 3. —(AP)—Alleged Allied "win the war" plans for creating widespread new battlefronts against Germany—purportedly by entangling Scandinavia, Rumania, Turkey, Greece and Yugoslavia in the European struggle—were published today by DNB, the official German news agency.

DNB asserted Allied documents seized by Hitler's conquering German armies in France constituted "the greatest of sensations... intrigue such as the world never yet has seen."

One of the documents, DNB said, was signed by Generalissimo Maurice Gamelin, former Allied commander-in-chief, dated last March 16, just three weeks before Germany marched into Denmark and Norway.

The five documents published today, a spokesman said, are only the first in a series in an official Nazi foreign office white book.

A second group, to be published tomorrow, deals with as-

serted Allied machinations to involve Turkey.

A third group, the spokesman said, concerns Allied preparations for the Flanders campaign.

The Gamelin document, as quoted by DNB, was entitled "conduct of the war" and called for action described as "wear and tear of German forces... in order to strike perceptible if not decisive blows against Germany."

DNB further quoted Gamelin: "At the moment, it appears very difficult to achieve good results on land outside the unoccupied areas. Therefore, Germany must be forced to come out of its present waiting position."

Supply Curb Planned. Among other plans, DNB said, the various documents called for "cutting off or destroying Swedish ore mines, and destroying Rumanian oil wells at Baku-Batum."

They were made public in anticipation of the issuance of the sixth white book of the war by the German foreign office.

RECORD DEPOSITS IN BANKS OF PORTLAND

Portland, July 3. —(AP)—Portland banks reported deposits of \$503,614,098 at the close of business Saturday in answer to the call issued Tuesday by the comptroller of currency.

It was the first time in history total deposits had passed \$500,000,000. Two of the seven banks reported minor declines but in main business continued the advance started after the 1933 holiday.

U. S. NAT'L SHOWS RECORD DEPOSITS

The United States National Bank, which has one of its important units in this city, responded to the comptroller's call by showing deposits of \$150,563,209.49 as of June 29, the highest shown by this bank in any comptroller's report by a large degree.

Compared with the statement published for the corresponding period last year, deposits have jumped from \$125,800,209.93, or a gain of \$24,764,999.56, an average increase of over two million dollars a month. During this period, resources have increased from \$136,676,386.39 to \$161,800,201.02.

The management of the local unit expressed gratification at this increase and stated that the increase locally was in keeping with that of the bank as a whole.
