20-30 PRESIDENT APPOINTS AIDES

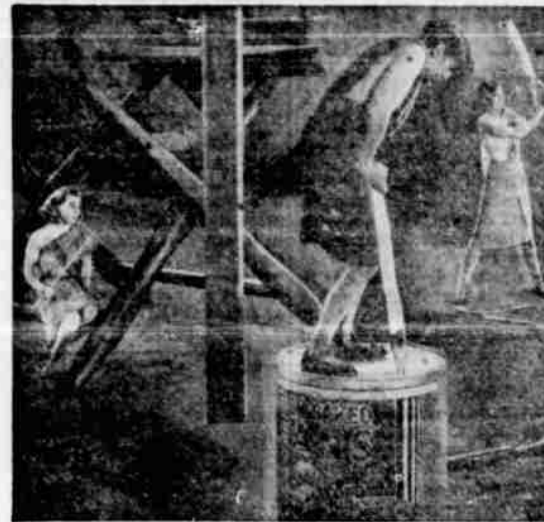
