2 egg yolks 2 tablespoons milk 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon chopped parsley 1/4 cup salmon (or other fish) 1/3 cup cooked corn 3 egg whites, beaten 2 tablespoons butter Beat yolks, add milk, salt, parsley, salmon and corn. Lightly fold in whites. Pour immediately into heated butter. Cover and cook slowly until omelet becomes very puffy on the top and brown underneath.

Buttered Green Beans 8 cups water 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 pound green beans 2 tablespoons butter 1/4 teaspoon paprika Add salt to water, when boiling add beans. Boil quickly until beans are very tender when tested with a fork. Do not cover. Drain well, add other ingredients, cover and place over a low heat for a couple of minutes.

128 VIOLENT DEATHS LISTED ON HOLIDAY; TWO BY FIREWORKS

By the Associated Press Although it was a "safe and sane" fourth as far as fireworks went, at least 128 persons met violent deaths throughout the country.

There were only two fireworks fatalities reported in an Associated Press survey, one in Colorado and one in Maine. At a Fort Worth, Tex., fireworks display a section of boardwalk collapsed, slumping 200 persons 15 feet, but none was killed; 40 were injured.

A year ago, according to the National Safety Council, the fireworks casualty list showed 13 deaths, 19 blinded in one or both eyes, and 5,341 others injured.

Automobile accidents accounted for at least 63 deaths and drowning for 35. The traffic toll thus was under the normal average of 75 estimated by the National Safety Council for a Thursday in July. The council set the normal average for a July Friday at 85, Saturday 130 and Sunday 130.

At least three persons were killed by lightning—two in Colorado and one in Pennsylvania.
