FIRE RAZES TWO PLANTS AT BEND

Bend, Ore., July 5.—(P)—Fire destroyed two industrial plants, threatened a number of other buildings and forced guests to evacuate a hotel here early today.

Operators of the destroyed Dechutes Farmers' warehouse and the Oregon Trail Manufacturing company estimated their losses at more than \$75,000.

The blaze, believed caused by fireworks, wrecked about \$25,000 worth of machinery and ruined a quantity of wool, clover, and grain at the warehouse. Don B. Stuart, manager, placed the total destruction at \$48,000. The Oregon Trail company, a furniture manufacturing concern, was appraised at \$32,000.
