 Only once were the Craters ahead — in the fourth, when Cook's single to center, Wray's double to right-center and McLean's single to left, drove home two runs after Silverton scored once in the second on errors by McDonald and Cook, and Moe's long fly to Peterson in center field.

It was 2 to 1, Craters, when the Red Sox unleashed their five-run burst in the fifth to tie the contest. In this frame Wilson singled to right, Kirsch singled in field, loading the bases.
