All phases of college life will be discussed Wednesday at 8 p. m. when the Oregon Federation presents a program to prospective University of Oregon students, their parents and others interested, in the Medford high school auditorium.

Purpose of the meeting is to acquaint prospective students, parents and the general public with the realities and benefits of higher education in the state. A colored movie film of campus life and activities will be shown as a part of the program. Campus living accommodations, activities and attendance financing will be among subjects discussed. The session will be conducted by Gleason Payne, president of the Oregon student body and Roy N. Vernstrom, federation director who are visiting all parts of Oregon on a 10,000 mile trip.

COMING REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL DEFENSE COIN SPURS NEW TAX PLEA

Washington, July 8.—(P)—President Roosevelt's coming request for a \$5,000,000,000 defense fund was reported reliably today to authorize arms for a second million men.

The new program also contemplates additional facilities for making munitions, so that, in an emergency, full equipment for even larger land forces could be turned out in relatively short order.

A message setting forth the expected to go to congress by the middle of the week. Talk of the proposed fund, much the largest of its kind in peacetime, gave impetus to demands for another billion-dollar-a-year increase in taxes to meet defense costs. Senator George (D-Ga.) predicted the tax boost would be linked with the request for \$4,000,000,000 for the army and \$1,000,000,000 for the navy.

The following garments were included in the recent shipment: 45 pairs men's socks; 5 men's sweaters; 10 beanies; 19 mufflers; 30 children's sweaters; 30 hospital bed shirts; 12 infant's layettes; 20 children's dresses; 20 women's dresses; 5 boy's shirts; 5 convalescent robes.

COMMANDER OF FLEET ARRIVES UNHERALDED FOR TALK WITH F. D. R.

Washington, July 8.—(P)—Travelling as secretly as the fleet he commands, Admiral J. O. Richardson arrived unexpectedly today at the navy department from Hawaii, where the United States battle armada is now stationed.

The department did not disclose the presence of the fleet's commander in chief until a day after he reached Washington yesterday.

He was scheduled to have lunch with President Roosevelt today. Observers expected that Richardson would discuss with the high command the pressing question of where to keep the fleet, as well as lessons in naval operations learned from the European war.
