Whitman Lives Up To All-American Reputation Here

Dick Whitman, Silverton centerfielder who made the All-American semi-pro team at Wichita, Kas., last season, certainly lived up to his reputation here over the week-end . . . ## CRIPPEN TO HURL FOR MEDFORD IN TOURNEY TONIGHT

Manager Tommy Hawkins said last night that Steve Crippen, curve-balling righthander, would be on the firing line tonight when the Medford Craters go against the Tillamook Cheesemakers at Portland's Vaughn street park, home of the Pacific Coast league Beavers.
