

HUNGARY WARNED BY HITLER NOT TO UPSET APPECART

Leaders Told This Is Not Time to Press Claims On Rumania Too Aggressively

Munich, July 10.—(P)—Hungary's leaders were told definitely by Adolf Hitler and the foreign ministers of Germany and Italy today that Hungary must not upset the Balkan appecart at this time by trying "to secure her rights" from Rumania, informed German sources said.

Premier Count Pal Teleki and Foreign Minister Count Istvan Csaky, who came to discuss Hungary's demands that Rumania restore at least part of war-lost Transylvania to her, conferred first with Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop and Count Galeazzo Ciano and then were received by Hitler.

While both Hitler and Premier Mussolini of Italy are agreed that their program for scrapping the Versailles and other World war treaties means also revision in the near east, the informants said Hitler holds this is not the time for revisionists to press their claims too aggressively.

WHEELER EXPECTS F. R. TO TELL PLANS SOON

Washington, July 10.—(P)—Senator Wheeler (D., Mont.) said today that he had reason to believe that President Roosevelt would announce his plans about a third term before the Democratic national convention formally convenes in Chicago next week.

Declaring that his name would be presented to the convention unless the president announces that he will accept renomination, Wheeler said it would be useless for any other aspirant to seek the nomination under the latter circumstances.

CLOUDY OREGON SKIES ASSIST FIREFIGHTERS

Portland, July 10.—(P)—Clouds banked on Oregon skies pulled down temperatures today and assisted legions of firefighters in forest protection.

The 2500-acre fire in the Dee district of Mount Hood national forest was held in control and reduced crews began mopping up. A successful check on the blowout creek fire in the Detroit area released a number of the 400 fighters. Only a small crew remained on duty at the 20-acre burn near Oakridge.

ITALIAN WARSHIPS FORCED TO COVER IN BRIEF BATTLE

"It must be assumed that the often circulated by the enemy," quickly retorted that the clash had "developed into a chase of Italian naval forces, at least one heavy unit of which suffered damage, have gained the shelter of their home defenses," the admiralty added.

The Italian communique, which admitted casualties of 29 killed and 69 wounded, insisted the Italian naval forces sought out the British men of war "to head off" an apparent British plan to attack Italian coastal positions and succeeded in contacting the enemy.

One Britisher Sunk
The Italians said one British warship—"probably a battleship"—was sunk while "only one of our warships was hit." They admitted, however, the sinking of the Italian destroyer "Zeffireo" and loss of one submarine.

Then, the communique declared, after brief, intensive firing, "the enemy gave up its objective and moved off toward the southeast."
Italy's claim of seeking the initiative in the sea battle differed markedly from the British account, which reported its royal navy "made contact" with the Italian ships and pursued them in flight.

By contrast, the Italian communique said:

"Our aviation, notwithstanding extremely strong anti-aircraft fire, followed the enemy until darkness, striking some of its ships with bombs of heavy calibre."

Descriptions of the battle under victory-flaring headlines in the London press said the British Mediterranean fleet under its commander-in-chief, Ad-

miral Sir Andrew Cunningham, engaged an Italian force of two battleships, a number of eight-inch and six-inch gun cruisers and numerous destroyers.

Raida Continue
German air raids on Britain continued. The British said eight German planes were shot down and five persons were killed in Nazi attacks yesterday.

FRENCH PARLIAMENT APPROVES PLAN FOR FASCIST GOVERNMENT

Vichy, France, July 10.—(P)—The French national assembly passed tonight a bill giving the Petain government full powers to draft a new French constitution. The vote was 569 to 80. There were 15 abstentions.

The two houses of parliament, sitting as one body, thus literally voted themselves out of existence.

They approved the Petain government's plan to give France a government modeled after fascist Italy.

Members of parliament, however, will hold their jobs for several months until the new constitution is drafted, but they will have little to do.

Draft Proposed
Washington, July 10.—(P)—Senator Lodge (R-Mass.) proposed in the senate today that enough men between 21 and 25 years of age be drafted to build the nation's peace-time army to 750,000 men.

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"3. To procure reserve stocks of tanks, guns, artillery, ammunition, etc. for another 800,000 men or a total of 2,000,000 men if a mobilization of such a force should become necessary.

"4. To provide for manufacturing facilities, public and private, necessary to produce critical items of equipment required for a land force of 2,000,000 men, and to produce the ordnance items required for the aircraft program of the army and navy—guns, bombs, armor, bomb sights and ammunition."

Training Need Seen.
Mentioning that congress was considering enactment of a system of "selective training" to develop "the necessary man power to operate this material and man power to fill army non-combat needs," Mr. Roosevelt commented—but without specifying what plan he favored:

"In this way we can make certain that when this modern material becomes available, it will be placed in the hands of troops trained, seasoned, and ready, and that replacement material can be guaranteed."

At one point Mr. Roosevelt declared: "We fully understand the threat of the new enslavement in which men may not speak, may not listen, may not think. As these threats become more numerous and their dire meaning more clear, it deepens the determination of the American people to meet them with wholly adequate defense."
