241 CCC ARRIVE ON SPECIAL TRAIN WOODRING WARNS U. S. HAS ALL IT CAN DO IN MINDING OWN BUSINESS

Woodring warns U. S. has all it can do in minding own business. The first replacement of the new quarterly period for CCC camps of the Medford district arrived here this morning. Detaining here were 241 enrollees. Of these 49 were for Camp Applegate, 50 for Camp 14 for Wimer, 55 for Annie Springs, 73 for Steamboat. The youths came from Mississippi and Louisiana of the army fourth corps area. Train commander was Cleodius Mangum, company commander at Camp Sitkum. The train, which made its first stop for the detaining of enrollees here, also carried replacements for the Vancouver barracks, Wash., district. It continued northward after the Medford district boys had detrained. Train with other Medford district replacements will arrive periodically from the south and east over the next couple of weeks, headquarters said.
