

SUPPLEMENT TO HATCH ACT NOW READY FOR PEN

Broadened Legislation Bars Some State, County, City Workers From Politics

Washington, July 11.—(AP)—The senate completed congressional action today on legislation to restrict political activity by state and local government employees who receive pay out of federal funds.

The measure, which was sent to the White House by the senate's acceptance of minor house amendments, would broaden the so-called Hatch act which already prohibits political activity on the part of federal employees.

The house had passed the legislation overwhelmingly yesterday.

Both the chief executive and Wendell Willkie, Republican presidential nominee, have endorsed the measure. It bars political activity by state, county and municipal workers paid in part with federal funds, limits campaign contributions to \$5,000 a person, and places a \$3,000,000 top on the expenditures of political committees.

Quick Action. With the potent backing of the two party heads, the bill went through the house in less than two days, although in the spring it had been a major controversy. The final house vote last night was 343 to 122, with 89 Democrats, 152 Republicans and two progressives favoring enactment. Opposed were 120 Democrats, Rep. Ball (R-Conn.) and Rep. Marcononio (A.L., N.Y.).

The legislation supplements the Hatch law, enacted last year, forbidding political activity by most federal employees. This year's bill covers many state highway department workers, agricultural agents, and the like. All workers affected by the two measures may continue to vote but can not participate in political campaigns or management.

the Italian serial attack force returned with damage and with wounded crewmen—hit by terrific drum-fire from surface ships. Three Italian planes were lost.

By contrast, Sir Andrew Cunningham, commander-in-chief of the British Mediterranean fleet, reported that his ships suffered not a single casualty.

Claim Hood Fired. The Italian high command, in a belated communique, insisted, however, that Italian bombing planes set fire to the 42,100-ton British battle cruiser Hood, world's biggest warship, scored two bomb hits on the deck of the 22,000-ton aircraft carrier Ark Royal, and two on "another English battleship."

The British admiralty issued a formal denial.

This was apparently the opening clash of the undecided battle between the British and Italian navies for control of the Mediterranean—climaxed when the Fascist war fleet reportedly was driven to the shelter of shore defense guns.

In the eastern Mediterranean, where Turkey is mobilizing against fears of a Russian coup against the Dardanelles, official Soviet quarters insisted today that Russia has no intention of making any demands on Turkey.

"There are no reasons for the U. S. S. R. to attempt to get control of the Dardanelles," a spokesman said. "Our relations with Turkey are good, and the straits are open to us."

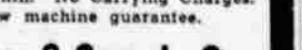
