

### DEFENSE TOILERS TO RECEIVE WAGE ON PRESENT BASE

#### Roosevelt Against Raising Ceiling for Hours Above which Overtime Pay Due

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt asserted at a press conference today that the administration would go ahead with its present policy of maintaining standards under the wage-hour act for work on the defense program.

The chief executive spoke at a press conference shortly after the navy department awarded contracts totaling \$136,743,906 as a part of the vast program to build up the nation's Pacific and Atlantic defenses.

Mr. Roosevelt read to reporters a letter which he said Colonel Philip B. Fleming, wage-hour administrator had written him which covered the question of the necessity of raising the ceiling for hours, above which time and a half must be paid.

#### Few Complaints

Fleming informed the president that any complaints from key defense industries that payment of time and a half for overtime was making their operation difficult would be brought promptly to Mr. Roosevelt's attention. The administrator added that only three such complaints, all from small

establishments, had been received. To help bolster western defenses, contracts totaling \$30,870,000 were let for aviation facilities in the Pacific including Pearl Harbor and the nation's other island possessions. In the east one contract alone provided \$24,204,000 for aviation shore facilities at naval Quonset Point air station in Rhode Island.

A formidable army striking force of some 6,960 tanks—several hundred of them huge land battleships—was disclosed today as one major objective in President Roosevelt's new \$1,848,171,957 preparedness program. Persons familiar with the plans behind the dollar marks said that the intention would be to double the total of 3,109 tanks which now are either in service, on order, or covered by appropriation.

### PACKARD AGREES TO BUILD ENGINES

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—The defense commission announced today that directors of the Packard Motor company had approved a "general arrangement" for production of 9,000 Rolls Royce airplane motors for the United States and Great Britain.

William S. Knudsen, commissioner in charge of coordinating defense production, said contracts were being prepared covering this arrangement. The announcement came after more than three weeks of negotiations on a contract which Henry Ford previously had declined to undertake on the ground that he would make munitions only for the United States.

### WAR PROFITEERS FACE PROSECUTION

Washington, July 12.—(AP)—The treasury threatened prosecution today of dealers allegedly misrepresenting price increases as due to new defense taxes. A department statement reminded dealers that they were subject to fines up to \$1,000 or imprisonment up to one year, or both, if convicted of misrepresenting the portion of prices caused by federal taxes.

Officials pointed out that the recent tax increases amounted to one-half cent on a package of cigarettes, \$1 on a barrel of beer, 75 cents a gallon on whiskey, one-half percent on refrigerators, radios, automobiles, and automobile parts one-half cent per gallon on gasoline, and one-fourth cent per pound on tires.

### RUNAWAY CAR HITS HOUSE IN ASHLAND

Ashland, Ore., July 12.—(AP)—Ashland's automobile "blitzkrieg" is continuing, police reported today.

Twice in the same day automobiles got out of control and attacked two buildings, the first a garage, then a private residence.

Last night Ray Rapp, Talent, and Russell E. Seaman, Medford, parked their car. It rolled two hundred feet and knocked a house off its foundations. The automobile owners said they would pay all damages.

#### Fascists Claim Successes

The Italian high command reported fascist air successes in a new attack on the British Mediterranean fleet.

Italian planes again located and bombed the British naval squadron which engaged in the Ionian sea battle earlier this week, the high command said, setting an aircraft carrier aflame and seriously damaging two destroyers.

The Italian communique, injecting a dash of drama into the usually prosaic official accounts, said that the battle raged for several hours, near Malta, and that "our squadrons descended through mist and violent anti-aircraft fire" to within a few hundred yards of the British surface ships.

"The aircraft carrier, struck by a heavy-calibre bomb, stopped suddenly with flames on board visible from above. Several ships speeded to its aid."

British and Italian "flying columns" of mechanized troops raided each other's outposts in the heat-baked desert regions of Italian Libya, Egypt and British-occupied Kenya colony.

#### Selassie Recognized

The African rooftop kingdom of Emperor Haile Selassie, the fugitive "Lion of Judah" who lost his throne to Italian conquest in 1935-36, also appeared likely to play a forthcoming major role in the struggle.

The British government officially recognized Selassie's government as "the lawful government of Ethiopia," and admitted it "to the full status of ally in the present war, with the assurances that Ethiopia's independence will be assured when the war is won."

The emperor's army, unofficially reported to number 200,000 native fighters, will be coordinated with British forces to assault Italy's armies in north and east Africa and in Ethiopia, it was announced in the house of commons.

There was no lull, even overnight, in the bitter battle for mastery of the air over England, or along the narrow straits of Dover across which German invasion might be sprung.

The toll of lives was high but undisclosed. Twilight bombings concentrated on southern England alone killed 14 and injured 47. That was after a day of ceaseless, wave after wave assault from coast to coast. Homes were splintered and streets splattered with machine-gun bullets.

### BAXTER MADE BISHOP FOR PORTLAND ZONE OF METHODIST CHURCH

San Francisco, July 12.—(AP)—Dr. Bruce Baxter, president of Willamette university at Salem, Ore., today was elected bishop of Portland area by the western jurisdictional conference of the Methodist church.

Dr. Baxter was elected on the thirteenth ballot.

The new bishop became president of Willamette university in 1934. He went to Salem from Los Angeles, where he was dean of the school of religion at University of Southern California. He was assistant to the president of U. S. C. from 1930 to 1934.

Salem, July 12.—(AP)—The Willamette university board of trustees probably will meet soon to select a successor to Dr. Bruce Richard Baxter, the university's popular 47-year-old president, Governor Charles A. Sprague, board member, said today.

Paul B. Wallace, president of the board, was out of town for the week-end.

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preliminary figures. The final tabulations will be announced from Washington, D. C. and probably will not be issued for several months, he said.

Other preliminary figures released by Mrs. Stuart showed 2,651 farms for Jackson county on April 1 as compared with 2,189 on April 1, 1930. This represented an increase of 462 farms or 21 per cent. The preliminary report, however, showed a decrease in the number of farms between January 1, 1935, when there were 2,901, the decrease in the five years being shown as 250 farms or 8.6 per cent.

The preliminary count for Medford, announced June 7, gave the city a population of 11,548 as compared with 11,007 in 1930, an increase of 541 or 4.91 per cent.

With the trend of the past couple of years from city to ru-

ral residence, it was anticipated that a substantial increase would be shown in suburban populations.

### 42-TON CLIPPER HOPS ON INAUGURAL FLIGHT TO FAR NEW ZEALAND

San Francisco, July 12.—(AP)—Carrying 27 persons and a cargo of airmail, the 42-ton American Clipper skimmed aloft from the seaplane base here today on a flight of 8,000 miles to New Zealand, inaugurating air service to the Antipodes.

The huge Boeing plane, commanded by Captain J. H. Tilton, chief pilot of the Pacific division of Pan American Airways, carried no paid passengers. Those aboard for the first flight were company employees and representatives of the federal civil aeronautics authority.

With Captain Tilton was a regular crew of 10. Others on the flight included Harold Gatty, who with the late Wiley Post, made history in 1931 on a round-the-world flight. Gatty, accompanied by his wife, now is PAA representative in New Zealand.
