

### MARY A. ASHPOLE FUNERAL SERVICE MONDAY, 2 P.M.

Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Adeline Ashpole will be conducted Monday at 2 p.m., from Perl's Funeral home with the Rev. W. A. Dawes, pastor of the First Baptist church, officiating. Interment will be in the family plot in Medford I.O.O.F. cemetery.

The passing of Mrs. Ashpole last Friday morning, removed another of the fast-dwindling number who crossed the plains to the western country in pioneer days. She was born February 20, 1855, in Andrew county, Missouri, and started, with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. T. Ellison, from Acheson, Kas., in 1865 in a train comprising twenty wagons and the same number of families. The wagon train reached the Willamette valley by way of Portland after experiencing the hardships of a five months journey through the wilderness.

In the same wagon train was young John Ashpole, and the acquaintance which began on the journey was culminated by their marriage in Newburg, Ore., on September 24, 1871. In the fall of 1873 the couple came to Jackson county, settling on Butte Creek where they farmed and raised cattle and horses.

In 1912 they moved to Medford, the family home being at 102 Tripp street. Mr. Ashpole passed away in 1929.

Survivors include two sons, C. W. Ashpole, of Medford, and Roy Ashpole, of Eagle Point, also three grandchildren, Donald, Pauline and Charles Ashpole, and one sister, Mrs. Eliza Haggey, of Sherwood, Ore.

Mrs. Ashpole was a member of the Baptist church throughout her life, her father having been a Baptist minister. She was exceedingly active for her years, until she became ill a few years ago, and enjoyed visits with a large number of people who had become her friends during her 67 years in this locality.

Pallbearers will be William Perry, William Brown, William von der Hellen, Alfred Gordon, Vern Brophy and John Perl.
