

# State Game Commission Cuts Blacktail Deer Limit to One Buck

## OPEN SEASON ON ANTLERLESS DEER AND DOES ENDED

### Starvation of Herds Seen Some Areas—No Pheasant Shooting in West.

Portland, July 13.—(P)—The state game commission cut the blacktail deer limit today to one buck—instead of the two formerly allowed western Oregon hunters.

Commissioners also voted against an open season on antlerless deer this year but continued cow elk as fair game in some sections.

The board was unanimous in denying an open season on does in Lake and Klamath counties, but George Aiken, Ontario member, dissented in the vote on Murders creek in Grant county.

Aiken, backing forest service, federal fisheries and wildlife department and its own experts, declared herds might face wholesale starvation if a hard winter occurred in over-crowded areas.

A storm of protest followed the commission's 1939 open season on antlerless deer.

The commission authorized issuance of 200 cow elk tags in Umatilla and Wallawa county areas. The northeastern Oregon elk season remains the same, from November 1 to 16, inclusive. Bag limits were unchanged.

Other open seasons include: Bull elk, Clatsop county—noon August 24 to sunset September 2.

Antelope—September 29 to October 6 inclusive, 2000 permits to be issued in Lake, Malheur and Harney counties.

China pheasant, Eastern Oregon—open season October 15 to 31, inclusive, except Malheur and Harney counties. Malheur county open October 15 to November 14, inclusive, and Harney county open only on October 19, 20, 23, 26, 27 and 30.

Sage grouse and prairie chickens—entire state closed all year.

Sooty and blue grouse—all counties closed except Union, Baker and Wallawa counties, open August 25 to 31, inclusive, and Clatsop county, open October 20 to 26, inclusive.

Valley, Bob White and California quail—no change in eastern Oregon, but all counties closed to pheasant hunting in western Oregon closed to quail.

Mountain or plumed quail—entire state closed.

Silver gray squirrels—open September 1 to October 31, inclusive, in Clackamas, Marion, Yamhill, Washington, Benton, Polk, Linn, Lane, Jackson, Douglas and Josephine counties.

The deer seasons, set by legislative edict, remain unchanged from September 20 to October 25, inclusive, except that certain of the reserves have been thrown open to hunting. These are the Canyon Creek, Mule Deer, Myrtle Creek, Mt. Emily, Ochoco, Steens Mountain and Warner (outside limits of federal reserve) reserves.

Application was made to the commission that it recommend federal regulations on migratory waterfowl hunting be changed to advance morning and extend evening shooting hours. It also was asked to urge a staggered season. Members of the commission expressed disfavor of the latter idea, but took no official action on either.

Antelope licenses will be issued by lot until August 1 if any remain. They will be distributed by application.

## FELLER CLOSE TO NO-HIT VICTORY

Philadelphia, July 13.—(P)—A blister kept Cleveland's Bobby Feller from chalking up his second no-hit, no-run game of the season, says Rollie Hemsley, Feller's battery mate.

The 21-year-old Iowa farm boy turned in a 1 to 0, one-hit performance against the Athletics Friday night.

For seven innings the pride of Van Meter, Iowa, mowed down the A's without a hit, only one man reaching first by getting a walk. Then Dick Siebert, first man up for the A's in the eighth, singled over second base.

"Siebert's a first-ball hitter," Hemsley declared. "If it wasn't for that blister we would have curved him on the first pitch. But the blister gave Bob trouble when he tried to throw a hook so we gave Siebert a fast one and he hit it."

The blister developed on the fourth finger of Feller's right hand and resulted, Hemsley explained, from the force with which the hurler gripped the ball.

## DANNING, WRIGHT LEADING HITTERS

New York, July 14.—(P)—They say Harry Danning, the National league's batting champion, is slipping. But a close inspection of his current batting average—a lousy .346—shows the "slippage" is about as rapid and as alarming as that of an iceberg.

The Giant catcher and "workhorse" is on top for the third straight week, his mark giving him the edge over Dixie Walker of the Dodgers, who is powdering the ball at a .335 clip.

Chicago, July 13.—(P)—The hot race for hitting honors in the American league continues unabated among four stalwarts who have been in the lead or close to it all season.

Taft Wright, Chicago's chubby right fielder, is the current pacesetter, having a fractional margin over his teammate, Luke Appling. Appling, who led the league in hitting in 1936 with a .388 mark, gained seven points, boosting him to .3557.

## TOWED DERELICT SINKS NEAR BAR

Portland, Ore., July 13.—(P)—Ninety minutes after the coastguard cutter Onondaga began towing her toward the Columbia river entrance tonight, the burned hulk of the freighter Hellenic Skipper sank.

The Onondaga notified her base by wireless that the lost ship went down by the stern. Coastguardsmen cut the towline a few seconds before the still-steaming derelict took her final plunge.

The cutter located the vessel earlier in the day and reported one mast and the stack still standing. Guardsmen got a line on an undamaged portion of the bow and began the tow attempt. The cutter did not give the location other than to say the derelict had been found in the trade lanes off the Oregon coast with burned wreckage trailing over her sides.

The crew of 21 abandoned the ship last Wednesday 20 minutes before a boiler room explosion.
