

Roosevelt Victory Likened To Apple With Worm in It In Journal (Dem.) Editorial

(Continued from Page One.) Franklin D. Roosevelt is regrettable for two separate and distinct reasons. The first was... that Mr. Roosevelt would do his country a service by saying outright, before the national conventions, that he would not run again for the presidency, thus removing from the campaign the bitterness which must go inevitably with his renomination... the other reason for hoping that Mr. Roosevelt would eliminate himself is that if he had done so one of the most respected of our traditions would not yet be under attack. He has not yet destroyed the tradition against a third term, but he is attempting to destroy it.

Mr. Roosevelt is a confession of poverty on the part of the Democratic party... that, of course, is a false picture. The truth of the matter is that the candidates of other potential nominees were killed in infancy by the president's silence as by his own intentions and by the activities of the hatchet men of the New Deal.

Philadelphia Ledger: As usual, Mr. Roosevelt has played his hand very cleverly... if he is defeated the president is in a position to put the blame on the Democratic party by saying that he advised the convention he had no "desire or purpose to continue in the office of president." Mr. Roosevelt may find out that being nominated does not mean he will be elected.

NAZI WARPLANES RENEW ASSAULTS ON BRITISH ISLES

slaughter stirred speculation whether it signalled the opening phase of a mass invasion by 600,000 Nazi troops, which a French newspaper, Le Petit Dauphinois, said earlier this week might come Friday.

Three civilians were killed and several wounded in a bomb raid on Britain's great Mediterranean stronghold of Gibraltar early this morning—the first casualties there of the war.

Raid Followed Speech The raid followed close on a fiery speech by Spain's Generalissimo Francisco Franco that Gibraltar must become Spanish once more and that Spain has "2,000,000 soldiers ready to face anyone and to support Spain's rights."

On the political front, Britons expressed satisfaction in the nomination of President Roosevelt as the Democratic party's candidate for a third term.
