

# FINAL WARNING GIVEN ENGLAND BY NAZI CHIEF

(Continued from page One.)

Count Galeazzo Ciano, the Italian foreign minister, arrived 15 minutes before Hitler and was given a seat of honor in the diplomatic box opposite the Fuehrer.

**U. S. Envoy Present**  
United States Charge d'Affaires Alexander Kirk also was in the diplomatic box.

Hitler entered the reichstag at 6:55 p. m. (8:55 a. m. PST) and seven minutes later, Field Marshall Hermann Goering opened the session.

Hitler began speaking at 9:05 a. m., PST, after the reichstag had risen in homage to the German and Italian war dead.

"There is no ground for the prolongation of the war," he said. "The British statesmen probably have no real conception of what it will mean, once the German offensive begins in earnest against the British Isles."

"Churchill would not dare to face the music. The people left behind in London would have quite a different conception than that of a government which had fled to Canada."

"Once more I will attempt to be a prophet," said Hitler, prophesying that "world empire will be destroyed" unless England listened to "reason."

Churchill, he said, may think it is Germany which faces destruction. "I know it will be England," he asserted.

**British Slow**  
Hitler said that England's efforts to disturb the relationship between Germany and Russia—based on "a clean delineation of spheres of interest"—were "doomed to failure."

He added sarcastically: "The British statesmen always see so much more slowly... perhaps they'll see this in due time."

Germany's pre-war program, Hitler said, was two-fold: Real friendship with Italy and "a similar relationship" with Great Britain.

With Italy he succeeded, he went on. It would have been a boon for both nations, he declared, had Britain and Germany come to a similar understanding.

With that kind of arrangement, he said, there could have been "a new life for Europe."

Hitler gave these as the reasons for his pronouncement:

"The necessity to open up to our own people an insight into the historical barrenness of the events which we are experiencing; to thank our soldiers and to attempt to direct once more—and this time the last—appeal to reason."

The western powers, he said, "needed a long war—not less than three years, as he said himself."

This desire for war by the allies, Hitler charged, has been established beyond possibility of challenge by documents "unique in history"—which fell into the hands of the German army.

These, he said, showed the allied will for war at any cost and their determination to use any and all nations for their purpose.

Hitler said "derision and mockery" greeted his October offer of peace to Britain.

As a result, he said, France "is down and out."

"The terrible misery which came over the French people... the misery of fugitives and evacuees... need not have come," he said, "as my offer was aimed at nothing but peace."

Hitler said "Churchill has begun to bomb the civilian population in Germany"—and added: "Thus far I have hardly answered this bombardment... but when my answer comes it will be terrible for millions of people."

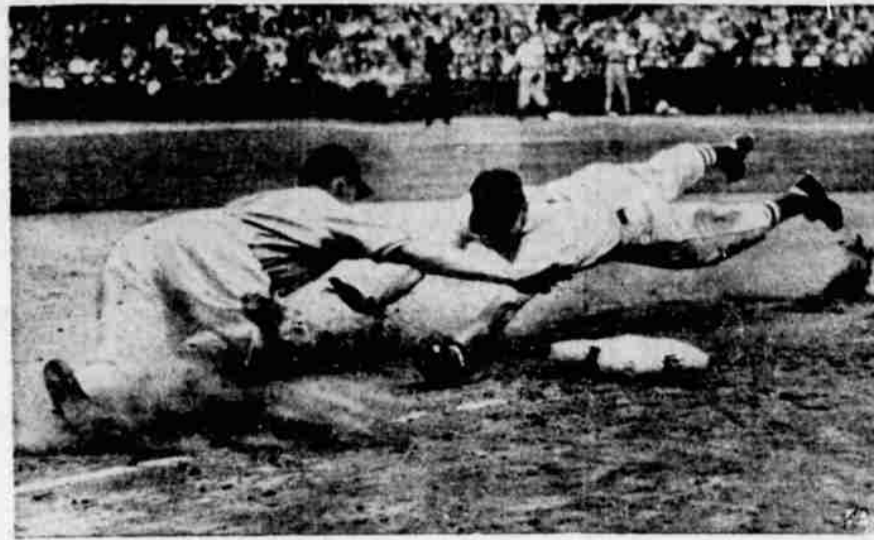

## Hydroponics May Yet Bring Apartment-Grown Vegetables

Berkeley, Cal.—(P)—A miniature jungle in the home of Dr. W. F. Gericke forecasts a day when even the most cramped-up apartment dweller may have a garden.

It's another step in the development of "hydroponics," the scientist's widely advertised system of growing plants in water.

In his home here, Dr. Gericke

has a series of standardized growing basins, resembling anything from a saucepan to a suitcase.

As in outdoor water-culture, the unit consists of a tank to hold water and a wire-mesh tray to hold the plant. The wire is covered with vegetable fiber—shredded redwood bark right now—to support seeds and growing stalks.

The roots grow down into the water. About once a month the grower pours in powdered chemicals that supply nutrients plants normally would obtain from soil.

Gericke is cultivating some 30 kinds of plants, some edible

some ornamental, studying their development and apparent needs. All the plants are doing well.

"It appears physiologically possible to grow any field, vegetable or floral crop without soil," says Gericke. "But with some the cost of equipment and of chemicals precludes economic production."

"Crops like potatoes and tomatoes, which are composed predominantly of water, can be known economically, and that appears true of various floral crops."
