HITLER CONFERS WITH RUMANIAN LEADERS IN MOUNTAINTOP RETREAT

Berlin, July 26.—(P)—Adolf Hitler this afternoon received Rumanian Premier Ion Gigurtu and Foreign Minister Mihail Manoilescu in the great hall of the Berghof, his mountaintop retreat at Berchtesgaden. German Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop and the Rumanian minister to Berlin were present at the conference.

Informed circles said the Rumanian statesmen would leave tonight for Rome after the conference on Rumania's new pro-Nazi course. Germany set her hand to stabilizing the continent she has virtually mastered after a 10-months war today, while continuing to send her waves of bombers against Britain.

With Rumanian, Bulgarian and Slovak representatives journeying to the reich between now and Sunday for conferences on the future of southeastern Europe, informed sources disclosed some 250,000 Poles, still held as prisoners of war, soon will be released to contribute their labor to Germany's "new Europe."

G. B. S., 84 YEARS OLD, CHUCKLES AT GERMANS

London, July 26.—(U.P.)—George Bernard Shaw, white-bearded Irish humorist who has set continents laughing either at or with him, was 84 years old today. He chuckled at German wireless reports that he had been arrested for anti-war activities, and said of his birthday: "It would be kinder to forget it."

Shaw does not like to be reminded of his birthday.
