

# BERRIES ATTRACT MANY TO CENTERS OF ROGUE FOREST

Some Places Provide Good Picking, But Others Are Blank—Fishing Is Good

The following recreational bulletin was issued today by Rogue River national forest headquarters:

"The berry patches are engendering the most activity this week in the Rogue River national forest.

"Many people are combining berry picking, fishing and camping for family outings. At Huckleberry mountain, the crop is concentrated in small areas which provide good picking, while other areas have no berries. There are many green berries at this time which will extend the season for three or four weeks.

"The guard at Huckleberry guard station will be glad to direct pickers to the best patches. Additional stoves and tables have been provided in the forest camp since last year. Wild blackberries are now ripe along the streams in the vicinity of the Union Creek forest camp; direc-

tions for finding them may be secured at the ranger's office. Black cap raspberries may be found on the Umpqua divide by taking the Tiller Trail highway to the Divide guard station, and then turning to the east on the Ragsdale Butte road.

**Berries Scattered**  
 "Good huckleberry picking, although somewhat scattered, is available at Blue Rock in the Butte Falls district. The lookout man stationed there can point out the spots for good picking. Bears may often be seen feeding in the berry fields, and deer with this year's fawns are common along the roads in this vicinity, as are mountain quail and native pheasants with their young.

"Huckleberries may be found in fair quantities along the Dead Indian road, between the Deadwood junction and the road camp, and good picking is available on Big Draw creek and Brush Mountain south of this road. There are scattering patches near Lake O' Woods, and here again directions may be obtained at the ranger's office. Brown mountain near Lake O' Woods, where many pickers go each year, has practically no berries this season.

"The evergreen blackberries in the Applegate district are not yet ripe; bushes laden with green berries promise an abundant crop in a few weeks.

**Fishing is Good**  
 "Many lakes and streams in the forest offer attractive fishing. At Lake O' Woods perch are being easily caught with worms and grasshoppers and a few bass are being taken with plugs and bass flies. At Klamath lake exceptionally large rainbow—some weighing six pounds—are caught by trolling. Fishing at Fourmile lake is good in general, especially good catches of rainbow are being made in the evenings. At Fish lake eastern brook are still biting but not many fishermen are going there now. Hyatt lake is yielding practically no catches. In cooperation with the state game commission, two fire guards are planting 25,000 eastern brook trout in the lakes of the Mountain Lakes Primitive area this week.

"At Seven lakes and the other small lakes along the Cascade summit, catches are not so good as usual; worms and grasshoppers are the best bait. In the south and middle forks, grasshoppers and brownhackle flies bring good catches, although the trout are rather small. Big Butte creek is fair with bait and brown flies.

"The upper Rogue river above Union creek offers good fishing; Castle and Crater creeks are the best small streams in that vicinity.

**50 Fires So Far**  
 "The entire length of Rogue river from Elk creek to Grants Pass is reported as excellent for trout fishing although here also the trout are smaller than usual. The most successful flies are royal coachman and flying caddis. The present cool spell may bring steelhead but there are very few at present; a few jack salmon have made their appearance. The water in the river is very low for this time of year.

"There have been eight man-caused and 42 lightning fires in the Rogue River national forest so far this season, all of them having been successfully confined to small areas. With the present increased activity in the

more remote sections of the forest, the danger of man-caused fires is greater and all visitors are urged to refrain from smoking while traveling and to extinguish carefully all lighted material. One-fourth of all fires in the national forests are started by careless smokers and one-tenth by careless campers who build their campfires too large or leave them without drenching them with water and then testing the embers with bare hands to be sure they are dead before left."

newspaper men on his walk to the chamber, Cline said:

**No Grudge**

"I have no grudge against anybody. I am going to meet my God."

The Rev. P. W. Eriksen of Salem, who accepted Cline in the Lutheran church several days ago, spent the night in the death cell. The miner ate a substantial dinner at 6 p. m. Thursday and had coffee at midnight. He slept for two hours and conversed quietly with the minister much of the remaining time.

"His faith held him up," Rev. Eriksen said.

The body was turned over to the Odd Fellows organization and burial will be at government expense. Cline was a World War veteran.

Cline, who did not appeal, killed Rosenthal in August, 1939. Chetty arrived at Fossil, Ore., from the midwest on May 1, 1940, to join Cline in a gold mining venture. He was slain the following day.

**Appeal Denied**

The Rev. Eriksen and the Oregon Prison association asked Governor Charles A. Sprague to stay the execution but the appeal was denied. The prisoner's attorney, Arthur Tarlow of Portland, asserted several weeks ago that Cline did not desire an appeal and that there were no grounds upon which to base the action.

London, July 26.—(P)—The British admiralty announced tonight that "steps are already well advanced for manning French warships which arrived in our ports before the signing of the armistice between France and Germany."

The announcement added: "A number of French ships of varying sizes are now being manned and prepared for sea entirely by officers and men of the free French naval forces headed by Admiral Meslier.
