## Concert by Abramowitsch Under Stars, Rare Treat

By Mrs. E. E. Gore. Presaging a season of musical and cultural activity, the Medford Musical society, under direction of its newly elected president, Mrs. A. O. Bauman, presented Bernhard Abramowitsch, concert pianist of San Francisco, in recital Friday evening at the home of Dr. and Mrs. C. W. Lemery.

A delightfully informal and pleasing effect was achieved by placing the piano on the veranda and seating the 150 guests on the terrace. Notwithstanding threats of rain earlier in the day, the evening proved warm, reminding many of the glorious Hollywood Bowl concerts of California.

Mr. Abramowitsch received musical education in the foreign capitals of the world, beginning his studies at the age of six. He has been in this country only three years, but is already well known on the coast as a concert pianist and coach. His playing is characterized by meticulous attention to artistic detail and since he has complete mastery to his instrument, he possesses the power to interpret the classic and modern masters in the vital spirit of the composer.

While each number on the

artistically arranged program was a revelation of beauty expressed in tone, the virtuosity of the Schubert sonata, Op. 143 in A-minor, played entire, and the cameo-like perfection of the Chopin nocturne in G-minor, were especially enjoyed. His encores were Valse in A-flat, Chopin, and The Juggler, Tsch.

The program was announced by Mrs. Rawley Moore, and the general committee, which secured outstanding cooperation of the membership, was the president, Mrs. A. O. Bauman, Mrs. H. C. Obye and Mrs. Wm. H. McAllister.
