## EDUCATION, LESS ARRESTS, NEEDED FOR GAME CODES

Tillamook, July 27.—(P)—Wild life conservation should be sought through education, not arrests, W. J. Smith of Portland told the eighteenth annual state convention of the Izaak Walton league today.

Conservation can be brought about by the public itself through proper stimulation of interest in wild life, thus eliminating much of the need for enforcement, the Oregon Wild Life federation head said.

He stressed the need for research and investigation to make game management more adequate.

The convention adopted resolutions calling for perpetuation of league objectives through a state committee and sponsorship of a school conservation program. Directors from each chapter will compose the committee.

Carl E. Green, Portland, secretary of the state sanitary authority, said treatment of sewage systems in Oregon had increased in recent years, with 44 per cent of the state's cities now having sewage treatment systems.

Los Angeles, July 27.—(P)—Detective Lieut. Pat Murphy said James C. Bates, 45, admitted shooting his estranged wife, Mary, to death today "in a quarrel over Hitler."

Murphy quoted Bates as saying his wife refused to live with him after she returned from a trip to Germany last year, but said Bates declined to give further details of their quarrel as they sat in a parked car.

## ALLOT FUNDS FOR DOUGLAS CO-OP

Roseburg, July 27.—(P)—R. L. Adams, North Douglas Electric Cooperative superintendent, said today that the rural electrification administration had allotted \$177,000 for lines to serve the new organization.

The funds will pay for 172 miles of transmission lines making service available for 375 members. The system will extend from Cleveland, about 15 miles west of Roseburg, to the north county line, touching all communities west of the Pacific highway.

It also will be built into the valleys east of Yoncalla and Drain. Power will be obtained from Bonneville through a tie-in with the Lane county transmission system at Creswell.

Adams said the R.E.A. had authorized the association to make loans totaling \$6000 to assist members of the new cooperative in wiring farm homes.

Construction probably will start about the middle of August, Adams said, with the project scheduled for completion about November 1.

Urbana, Ill., July 27.—(P)—Arne Rae, executive secretary of the National Editorial association, has been appointed an associate professor in the University of Illinois school of journalism, the institution announced today.
