BROWDER PETITIONS FOR REVIEW OF CASE

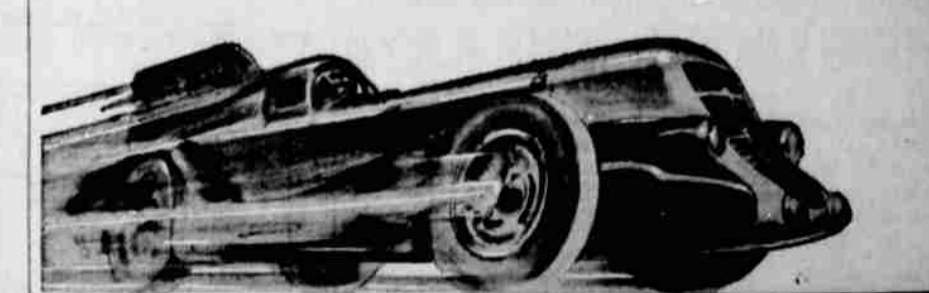
