## MEDFORD GUARDS OFF SUNDAY FOR 3 WEEKS, OR YEAR

Y. Tengwald, commanding, and Lieuts. Weldon H. McBee and Bruce W. Moffatt. Lieut. James W. Grigsby commands headquarters detachment.

Two converted army dining cars and a baggage car were to be loaded with equipment today in preparation for Sunday's departure. In addition the special train, as made up here, will have three coaches. The train will depart at 12:01 p. m. Sunday.

At Grants Pass the Grants Pass unit of the Oregon national guard and a California national guard company from Eureka will entrain. Additional units will be picked up at Roseburg, Eugene and Albany. After the Albany stop the train will comprise 21 cars conveying 582 men, Capt. Tengwald said.

## Use New Rifles

Like other units of the 186th regiment, Company A will use the new semi-automatic Garand rifle in maneuvers for the first time this year.

All the Medford guardsmen are in good condition and ready for whatever lies ahead of them—three weeks of strenuous maneuvers or a year or more of active duty, Capt. Tengwald and Lieut. Grigsby declared.

Salem, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Four thousand Oregon national guard troops will leave Sunday in five trains and four motor convoys for three weeks of maneuvers at Fort Lewis, Wash., and they don't know when they will return.

While they are fighting their mock war with 36,000 other troops, they might receive the order that will keep them mobilized at Fort Lewis for a year.

The only Oregon guardsmen who won't attend the maneuvers are the 600 men of the 249th coast artillery regiment, which already has had its field training for this year. However, it is scheduled for a year's mobilization at Camp Clatsop at the same time as the rest of the guard is ordered mobilized at Fort Lewis.

## FIRST DETACHMENTS OF NATIONAL GUARD REACH ENCAMPMENT

Yelm, Wash., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Advance detachments of over 23,000 national guard troops from eight far western states moved into southwest Washington by truck and train today while some 17,000 regular army units already encamped in the area rushed final preparations for the biggest peacetime military maneuvers ever held on the Pacific slope.

As the first troops attached to the national guard's 40th division arrived in the Centralia-Chehalis region south of here and Camp Murray, to the north, received initial contingents of the 41st national guard division, over 100 high-ranking officers who will judge the effectiveness of the giant concentration opened an umpire school at 9th corps headquarters here.

Meanwhile, at its Fort Lewis headquarters, the regular army's third division laid out plans for the part it will play during the first 10 days of the three week maneuvers—that of loaning men to national guardsmen to aid in training and organization for the "war."

## PORTLAND TRUCK DRIVERS STRIKE

Portland, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Two hundred AFL teamsters struck at four general transfer companies today after collapse of contract negotiations with the Portland Draymen's association.

The association has 24 other affiliated companies with about 800 drivers not immediately affected by the walkout.

Jack Schlaicht, financial secretary for Teamster Local No. 162, said the union first demanded a 20 per cent wage increase but offered to compromise. The proposal was rejected by the employers, he added.
