FRANCE PUTS BAN ON FREEMASONRY

Vichy, France, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The Vichy government has ordered dissolution of Freemasonry and all other secret societies in France, it was announced today.

The press charged Freemasonry with offenses ranging from sipping the morale of France to undermining Marshal Petain's efforts to re-establish the "work, family and fatherland" idea among the people.

The newspaper Le Nouvelliste of Lyon declared "Our foreign enemies never would have been able to succeed against us if France had not been literally assassinated by the venom of secret lodges."

The newspaper asserted that Freemasonry systematically deprived the French of their ideals, adding: "France without ideals has become a defeated France."
