BRITONS ACCEPT WAR IN STRIDE

Portland, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Caltness has marked Britons since the outbreak of war, Mrs. Ralph Barnes, whose foreign correspondent husband, was expelled from Germany, said today.
The former Portland girl reached here from England with her two daughters and told an interviewer she would stay for an indefinite period, probably for the duration of the war.
Barnes, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Barnes of Salem and correspondent for a New York newspaper, was ordered out of Germany June 21 for disseminating stories capable of "disturbing the friendly relations of Germany and other states."
Mrs. Barnes said she last heard from her husband, a Williams University graduate, at Istanbul, Turkey, 10 days ago while he was en route to Alexandria.

Fire Damages Hall, Monmouth College
Monmouth, Ore., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Fire damaged Nelson Hall, girls' living quarters just off the Oregon College of Education campus, last night. C. W. Allen, manager of the residence, estimated loss at \$10,000.

TOAD HORDE EATS KLAMATH INSECTS

Klamath Falls, Aug. 3.—(AP)—A toad war on herds of ravenous cutworms created embattled Klamath farmers today.
The toads moved in while farmers were busy fighting the insect pest with aerial cropping and other methods.
As Mrs. E. B. Loosley of Fort Klamath described the scene, "a phalanx of toads is moving relentlessly across the fields, devouring the variegated worms as if they were put there to provide rations."
Augmenting this "infantry" are seagull "bombers" wheeling overhead, supported by observation squadrons of noisy blackbirds.

Washington, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Major-General Henry H. Arnold, chief of the army air corps, returned from Alaska today and reported that work on the new air base at Fairbanks had advanced so rapidly that cold weather tests and training could be made in November, a year ahead of schedule.
