EFFECT OF FIRES IN FOREST AREAS EYED BY SAVANTS

College professors and U. S. forest service executives were making a study on the Rogue River national forest today of the effects of forest fires. The investigators are particularly interested in the effects of soil fires on the vegetation and forest erosion of the areas burned over. The study today was being made in the Butte Falls and Union Creek districts. The group intended to continue on tonight to Bend.

In the group today were R. G. Johnson, professor of range management, D. G. Mumford, professor of farm management, and J. C. Moore, bureau of agricultural engineering, all at Oregon State college. F. H. Brundage, associate regional U. S. forester at Portland, Fred W. Forest, division of range management at the Portland regional forest office, and Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue River national forest.

Those in the group, excepting Mr. Brundage, who arrived here by United Mainliner last midnight, arrived by car from Grants Pass yesterday in the Applegate district where a study of fire effects was made under the guidance of Lee Port, ranger in charge of the Applegate district. The study embraces recent fire areas, areas burned a long time ago, and areas burned over once and areas burned over more than once. The group stayed last night at Hotel Medford.

SALVATION ARMY HEADS ARRESTED

Tokyo, Aug. 6.—(P)—Seven Salvation Army leaders, reliably reported to be all Japanese, have been arrested on suspicion of espionage, the war office announced today. The arrests came with a countrywide roundup of Britons suspected of espionage, who at one time numbered more than a dozen, including many prominent business men. Now all but seven have been released. The war office said that those arrested included the Japanese commander-in-chief of the organization, which has its world headquarters in London. The arrests were made July 31, and the seven are still detained. There are 16 republics in the Soviet union.
