3 DIE IN BLAST AT POWDER MILL

Lebanon, O., Aug. 7.—(P)—Three men were killed today in a terrific explosion that wrecked a powder-processing building of the King Powder company, at nearby King's Mills.

They were Charles Resibois, 25, his son; Hobart Combs, 35, and William Reed, 45.

The powder plant, one of the oldest in the United States, occupies scores of small buildings along a one and one-half mile frontage.

C. G. King, chairman of the board, said the plant was not operating on government orders and that these, "if we have any," were being filled at the firm's Ashland, Ky., factory. There was no reason to suspect sabotage, he added.
