SENATE VOTES NATIONAL GUARD CALL

Washington, Aug. 8.—Preparations for defense of the western hemisphere in the event of an early German victory are being carried forward along two lines. The first is rearmament. The second is the hemisphere trade program, worked out at the state department and recently approved at the Havana conference.

THE trade program has changed so much that it is no longer clearly understood by most people. As originally conceived in the state and agriculture departments the program called for the establishment of a vast hemispheric marketing cooperative, or several smaller cooperatives, all financed and managed from Washington.

As conceived after the discussions at Havana, the program is far less ambitious and more practical. Broadly speaking, three steps are planned. (1)—The United States, being the

CHANCE TO RESIGN IS EXTENDED MEN WITH DEPENDENTS

Washington, Aug. 8.—(P)—The senate passed and sent to the house today legislation empowering President Roosevelt to order the national guard and army reserves to active military duty for a period of 12 months. The measure was passed by a vote of 71 to 7. Those recorded as voting against the bill were Senators Bulow (D., S.D.), Danaher (R., Conn.), Donahay (D., Ohio), Gillette (D., Iowa), Holt (D., Va.), Lundeen (FL, Minn.) and Nye (R., N.D.).

Announced army plans, however, call only for the immediate mobilization of the thirtieth, forty-first, forty-fourth and forty-fifth divisions and 22 smaller units. These comprise in all, 55,426 enlisted men, 53 warrant officers and 3,930 officers. Just before passage the senate wrote in a provision to permit resignations of guardsmen and reservists with families dependent on their earnings.

REFUGEE BILL HAS HOUSE APPROVAL

Washington, Aug. 8.—(U.P.) The house passed Wednesday and sent to the senate legislation permitting U. S. ships to evacuate refugee children from Great Britain. The measure, by Rep. Thomas C. Hennings, Jr., D. Mo. amends the neutrality act to permit American ships to enter prohibited combat zones without convoy to remove children on condition all belligerents guarantee safe conduct.
