You should be patriotic enough to offer your services for at least a year, instead of waiting for this compulsory training. You'll get it anyway, so why not do it of your own accord. I spent four years in Uncle Sam's army and it's not so bad. You ought to be able

Being a soldier isn't just a job; it's a career, and what you make it. And I am of the opinion that, in time, there is going to be a war.
