BODY NEAR MEACHAM NOT THAT OF GOETZE SAYS CRIME EXPERT

Pendleton, Ore., Aug. 13.—(AP) Dr. Joseph Beeman, University of Oregon medical school, crime detection laboratory, Portland, this morning examined the decomposed body found Friday near Meacham—believed by officers that of a man "taken for a ride many months ago"—then returned to Portland, taking samples of the man's clothing and papers found in his pockets. The condition of the body was such that Dr. Beeman was unable to tell what caused the man's death.

The papers, glued together by decomposition of the body, may yield important information if the laboratory workers are able to separate them. The doctor's examination set aside a theory that the body might be that of Albert C. Goetze of Ashland, who disappeared last September 24. Physical characteristics did not coincide, the doctor said.

OREGON FORTUNATE IN FOREST FIRE ABSENCE

Portland, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Forest fires have given Oregon less trouble the first six months of 1940 than the average havoc for the last five years, State Forester N. S. Rogers reported today. The state forestry department recorded 505 fires compared with the 737 average. He said 9,900 acres of destruction occurred principally in one fire. Lightning has set more blazes but campers and smokers fewer.
