Action from start to finish marks the new saga of frontier America. "When the Daltons Rode," which opened a four day run yesterday at the Craterian Theatre, with Randolph Scott and Kay Francis in the leading roles.

The Dalton gang, last great outlaw band of the old West, comes spectacularly to life in this screen version of the book of the same name by Emmett Dalton and Jack Jungmeyer, Jr. The mingling of excitement and comedy makes it particularly satisfying entertainment.

OVER MILLION NOW ENGAGED IN WORK FOR GOVERNMENT

Civil Service Commission Says Expanding Defense Program Has Added Many

Washington, Aug. 15.—(P)—The civil service commission reported today that the expanding defense program had pushed federal employment above the million mark for the first time. The number of workers in the executive branch of the government in June was 1,011,066, a jump of 33,976 or 3.4 per cent from May.

This compared with the World War peak of 917,760 on Nov. 11, 1918, and the previous peacetime record of 987,857 reached last December 31.

Commenting that the defense program "has resulted in especially significant employment during the past year," the commission said that between June, 1939, and June, 1940, the war and navy departments, the Panama canal authority and the civil aeronautics authority added 70,514 employees, which was 82 per cent of the total gain of 85,281 for the period.

Those four branches accounted for 19,733 new jobs during June, or about 60 per cent of the total increase. The national defense council appeared in the employment records for the first time with 67 workers, of whom 15 were listed as temporary. The staff has been increased greatly since June, however.

FREIGHTER CLAIMS U-BOAT ON TRAIL

New York, Aug. 15.—(P)—The Norwegian freighter Thermopylae, 6,655 tons, radioed today that she was being "tracked by a mystery ship" at a position well within the neutrality zone set up by the 21 American republics.

The ship's first message indicated by MacKay radio intercom a submarine attack. Later the ship said "no distress but please inform my position."

Coast guard officials began an investigation when they figured the ship was about 450 miles east of New York.

The Thermopylae traded between New York, Pacific coast ports and the Far East before the war.

MOUNTAINEERS OF FLOODED SECTION HERDED IN CAMPS

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 15.—(P)—Mountainfolk by the thousand huddled in hastily organized refugee camps in four southern states today as flood waters continued to pour from the Blue Ridge and the Great Smoky mountains. At least 16 persons have perished in the destructive gush of swollen mountain streams. Property and crop damage mounted into millions of dollars. Several northwestern North Carolina towns were isolated.

A let up in heavy rains that have grenched the mountain country since Friday, however, curbed the rise of numerous streams and made possible inauguration of a wide-scale relief program.

North Carolina was hardest hit, but extensive damage was reported in east Tennessee, southwest Virginia, northeastern Georgia and western South Carolina. All flood danger had passed at Augusta, Ga.
