An investigating city policeman said that Mrs. Smith, driving south on Holly street, had stopped at the stop street and had reached the center of the intersection when her car struck the bicycle, moving west on Main street. The officer quoted Mrs. Smith as saying that she saw the bicycle "quite a distance away" from her and that it suddenly ran right in front of her car. She said she was traveling very slowly when the accident occurred.
