SHAKESPEARE IN MAKESHIFT GARB GAINS APPLAUSE

Festival Cast Carries On After Fire With Strange Assortment of Costumes

Shakespeare in modern dress it was, both literally and physically, before a packed house at Ashland's civic Elizabethan theatre to see the final performance of "Much Ado About Nothing" given on schedule less than 24 hours after fire had swept through the storage and costume departments backstage and destroyed more than 65 per cent of all costumes.

True to the unwritten law of the theatre, the "show did go on" and drew round after round of applause and unreserved enthusiasm for the plucky youngsters, who faced with the gigantic task of re-building costumes for three entire shows, performed the job without a hitch.

Last night's showing was somewhat changed from the original presentation late last week. Tuxedos replaced the Elizabethan attire for several of the characters, uniforms of Ashland's National Guard company did the rest. Some of the feminine garb was salvaged from the smoke and water and re-faced and re-glittered.

Ashland's civic minded citizens responded to an appeal for help with all the equipment at hand, old clothes, hats, shoes and out-moded finery, and in record time from the battery of sewing machines humming on the lawn behind the theatre yesterday, came ample attire.

With exception of tuxedos and modern military uniforms, last night's audience found little material difference between the last and first showings of "Much Ado." If anything, the tempo of the production was enhanced by the added efforts of the cast. The comedy situations brought more laughter; dramatic sequences were keyed to a higher pitch and the invisible spark which fired the cast to new heights was caught by the audience.

Jimmie Baughman, in an old Civil war uniform, was a new and more lovable Dogberry; the villains, Delmar Solem, Don Shanahan and Doug Hubbard, were more dastardly; Jerry Vawter, clad in a bright blue uniform and military boots was an excellent Claudio while Dick Farmer and Harry Moses, reposing in the colorful regalia of the Oregon National Guard, carried their roles to new heights.

Melba Winston as Hero, was as pleasingly demure as ever while Ethel Mae Robinette as Beatrice, reached a new level. All members of the cast were given unreserved acclaim for their characterizations.

Tonight, patrons will see a modern dressed version of "The Comedy of Errors." Tomorrow night's "As You Like It" will close the sixth annual repertoire. Capacity crowds are expected for these two shows. The curtain will rise at 8:30.

JOHNSON OFFERED 'ATTRACTIVE' JOB

Reading, Pa., Aug. 16.—(AP)—State Commander Edward R. Stirling told the Pennsylvania American Legion convention today that Louis Johnson, former assistant secretary of war, was unable to keep a speaking engagement here because he "has just been appointed coordinator of national defense in the United States."

MERCHANTS ASSN. WOULD PUT CURB ON SOLICITATION

Medford Merchants Association Today Announced Appointment of a Committee to Pass on All Forms of Solicitation in an Effort to Stamp Out Schemes Which the Committee Secretary Said Take Many Hundreds of Dollars Out of the City Annually Without Doing Anyone but the Promoters Any Good.

To make the plan successful, all business houses and others must cooperate fully and sincerely, Frank Hull, committee secretary emphasized. No contributions should be made in any solicitation not approved by the committee but no one will be obligated to contribute to any approved solicitation, he stated. All forms of solicitation are embraced, whether the solicitation is made in person, by mail or by telephone, he explained.

The plan of solicitation control is intended for the protection of the business men themselves as well as the general public, Mr. Hull asserted. Primary object, he said, is to put an end to solicitation by outsiders who take money from the city without rendering any proportionate service to the community.

All applications for solicitation are to be made to Mr. Hull at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce. To make the plan completely effective, Mr. Hull asked that all local organizations of whatever character apply to him for approval of any kind of solicitation they might contemplate at any time.

An increase in solicitation of various kinds lately led to formation of the control committee, Mr. Hull related. He added that control is being exercised with marked success in many other cities and declared that with proper cooperation the same kind of complete success can be attained here.
