Simmerings Of Political Pot

By the Associated Press Washington—Secretary Ickes called Republicans "party of appeasement"; charged that Wendell L. Willkie was a member of Tammany Hall, and admiral of Samuel Insull, and a "rich man's Roosevelt."

Rushville, Ind.—Willkie characterized Ickes speech as "plain and simple falsehoods," expressed astonishment that President Roosevelt would "authorize" the address, and denied Tammany link and approval of Insull.

New York—Democratic National Chairman Edward J. Flynn asserted that Willkie's acceptance speech demonstrated that he believed "in most everything that the Roosevelt administration has accomplished."

Albany, N. Y.—Norman Thomas, socialist president candidate "applauded" Willkie's challenge to President Roosevelt to debate campaign issues, and invited the Republican nominee to debate with him, regardless of Mr. Roosevelt's acceptance.

Chicago—Senator Murray (D. Mont.) said Willkie's election would repudiate the new deal and be a "mandate for a program of reaction." He defined the "real issue of this campaign" as "Wall Street versus Main Street."

PROFIT CURB AND TAX DOUBTS HALT NAVAL CONTRACTS

British Buying Also Factor, Adm. Furlong Tells Senate Hearing.

Washington, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Tax uncertainties, a profit limitation and competitive buying, including that of the British, were reported officially today to have stopped "progress" on the navy's procurement of materials for shipbuilding.

The report came from Rear Admiral W. R. Furlong, who made it to the senate appropriations committee during testimony on a \$5,008,000,000 supplemental defense bill which the committee approved yesterday.

In another sphere of defense activity, the house military committee, meanwhile, gave its tentative approval to the registration for military service of men from 18 to 64, inclusive.

The committee has been working on a draft bill while the senate debated another version reported recently by its military committee. The senate version calls for registration of men from 21 through 30.

The admiral, chief of the navy's bureau of ordinance was quoted as saying that "I thought possibly this committee would be interested in knowing the facts that the progress has stopped on the procurement of materials that go into ships."

"The navy had no trouble whatever," he continued, "until business picked up and the army, having increased appropriations, began to buy guns without the operation of the Vinson-Trammell act (limiting profits). This and the foreign nations' and other government departments' buying without the operation of the Vinson-Trammell act has caused business from the navy to be unattractive."

Asked whether companies were diverting their capacities to other purposes, Admiral Furlong replied: "They are being used for other purposes. For instance, there's a long list of requests from the British purchasing commission and naturally they will go ahead and do the work that will not bind them by profit limitations."

His testimony led to talk in the committee of using a "universal tax" and other "force" to compel manufacturers to accept naval contracts the record of the hearings disclosed.

FIREBUG BLAMED FOR DIVIDE FIRES

A brush and timber fire in Miller's gulch today was held by a state forest crew and volunteers from Rogue River to an acre and a half. The blaze was attributed to a smoker.

Five fires along a half mile front on the south side of Green mountain on the Jackson-Douglas county line were blamed by state forest headquarters here today on an incendiary. It was the first reported instance of incendiaryism in this district this season.

The five fires had been reduced to two this afternoon and with favorable conditions patrol headquarters were of the belief they could be mopped up tomorrow. Each of the two fires covered eight to ten acres.

If the wind did not fan the fires anew this afternoon, 25 of the 50 Camp Wimer CCC enrollees on the fire lines would be released in the morning and the other 25, working with patrol crews, would mop up, the local office said.

CHURCHILL URGES SPEEDY DELIVERY AGED DESTROYERS

(Continued from Page One.) before the start of the war no prolonged defense there was contemplated. The British troops in Somaliland, he said, were withdrawn "virtually intact" to fight elsewhere.

He warned, however, that bigger operations are coming in the middle east. Invasion Now Difficult As for Britain, he insisted, "invasion becomes much more difficult week by week."

His request for the American destroyers was voiced in an appeal "to our friends across the ocean" to send the warships which will "bridge the gap between the peace flotillas of 1939 and the war flotillas of 1941."

There were other high points of Churchill's hour-long speech: Britain will permit no food to reach Hitler-dominated countries, despite American requests, because the nazis are taking the food of the defeated peoples for themselves.

Britain has 92,000 dead, wounded and missing in a little less than a year of war, compared with 265,000 in the first year of the last war, although countries and armies have vanished in this conflict on a scale comparable only to "barbaric times."

British, which he proclaimed stronger today than ever before, believes she can "continue the struggle indefinitely and as long as the enemy pleases and the longer it continues the more rapid will be our approachment to that superiority in the air upon which, in large measure, the decision of the war depends."

British new air production, he said, exceeds that of Germany, although Britain still is vastly outnumbered in the air itself; yet American planes just are beginning to come. "Cannon, rifles, machine guns, cartridges and shells" have been ferried in immense quantities, and safely, from America, he said, and "the British arm is at home—more than two million determined men have rifles and bayonets in their hands, and three-quarters of them are in regular military formation."

Plenty of Food "Our stocks of food of all kinds are many times as great as in the days of peace. . . . As in Nelson's day the maxim holds, 'Our first line of defense is the enemy's ports.'"

The prime minister, jeering at Hitler's proclaimed total blockade of England, declared bluntly that no food would be allowed to reach any country

Supplies Flood He said immense amounts of munitions from the United States had been landed in England "without the loss of a gun or a round" of ammunition, and he predicted that England, with the help of American production, eventually would get superiority in the air.

Until that time, he declared, Britain will keep on fighting Germany in the air "indefinitely and as long as the enemy pleases."
