GIRL FLYER AIMS AT RECORD MARK

Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 21.—(P) Betsy Ross, petite and 20, who wants to establish the first altitude record for light planes at 20,000 feet, waited today for the official result of her first attempt and declared "if it isn't over 20,000, I'll try again."

The 99-pound aviatrix, who has been flying only since June, 1939, circled her two-place cabin plane for three hours and eight minutes over the Harrisburg airport yesterday.

It was the first time light planes officially have been recognized in an altitude flight by the National Aeronautics association, said Russ Brinkley, NAA contest chairman.
