

J'VILLE TO OPEN SCHOOLS, SEPT. 9

Jacksonville elementary and high schools will open Monday, September 9. High school students, who have not registered, will register at the high school building between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. during the week of September 2 to 7.

Any pupil six years of age or before November 15 will be eligible for admission to the first grade, according to A. L. Beck, Superintendent.

Jacksonville school District No. 1 has purchased two new school buses for the school year 1940-41. One, a thirty-six passenger bus, will transport the elementary pupils from the East end of the district and high school pupils from Griffin Creek and Westside to Jacksonville. The other, a sixty passenger bus, will transport pupils from the Sterling and Rich districts.

RUSH FIRE CREWS TO MONTANA AREA

Hamilton, Mont., Aug. 22.—(P)—A special train loaded with 300 forest fire fighters, rolled into Hamilton today from Spokane, Wash., and the men were sent to battle more than 50 blazes flaming up in the rugged, densely-timbered Bitter Root valley.

Another 175 CCC enrollees from the Kaniku national forest moved in on the fire lines.

There was a sharp drop in temperature with cloudy skies holding some promise of rain to improve a situation regarded by forest rangers as "better but still tense."

The largest blaze, in the vicinity of Hughes creek, covered approximately 700 acres.

BLOCKADE ANGERS FRENCH OFFICIAL

Vichy, France, Aug. 22.—(P)—Britain's refusal to lift the blockade against France was termed "an act of hostility" tonight in a speech by Foreign Minister Paul Boudoin.

This, the foreign minister declared in answer to Prime Minister Churchill's Tuesday address, is "perhaps even more painful than the Mers-El-Kubir attack."

He referred to assault of the British fleet on French warships at France's North African base early in July, as a result of which the Pétain government broke off diplomatic relations with England.

"The French government will not bow before this decision."
