LIGHTNING FIRES RAGE IN KLAMATH

Klamath Falls, Aug. 23.—(AP) Eighteen fires were set this morning by lightning which cracked over the vast forest lands north and east of Klamath Falls. Worst blaze was on the Fremont forest northeast of Gerber dam, which had covered 50 acres by noon. This was the only lightning set fire still out of control at that time. A radio-directed crew under Klamath Forest Protective association leadership moved quickly through the forest lands this morning, controlling one lightning fire after another. Eight fires were stopped in this manner.

RUSSIA ASSERTS SHE AIDS NAZIS

Moscow, Aug. 23.—(AP)—The Soviet government newspaper Izvestia declared today Russia was helping Germany beat the British blockade by supplying her with raw materials and in return was receiving German industrial products, including armaments. Reviewing relations of the two powers since the signing last August 24 of their non-aggression pact, Izvestia hailed the treaty as still "the most important factor for peace" and asserted that under the trade accord, signed three days earlier, commerce between the two nations was the greatest since the world war.

DRIVER SEXTON MT. DEATH CAR HELD

Grants Pass, Aug. 23.—(AP)—A charge of involuntary manslaughter was placed against Bertie Frank Harmon, 22, Thursday afternoon the result of an automobile accident on Sexton mountain Sunday in which two Glendale men, Leo Roy Belcher and Glenn Martin Frost, met instant death. Harmon, his head swathed in bandages, waived preliminary hearing when arraigned before Justice of the Peace R. S. Anderson this morning and will enter his plea before Circuit Judge H. D. Norton Saturday morning.

The complaint alleges that the Grants Pass youth was driving under the influence of liquor and with willful and wanton disregard of the rights and safety of others. Harmon was arrested at his home late yesterday by state police and committed to jail.

Kansas City (AP)—Not many big cities go 85 days without a motor-car fatality. Kansas City did. A coupe smashed into a pillar to end death's holiday. But Kansas City's 1940 record of 11 auto accident deaths in six months remains excellent. How do Kansas Cityans do it? First, they have a police traffic safety division on the job 24 hours a day. This includes 44 motorcycle cops.

Second, there are five white motor cars equipped with loud speakers that go around town looking for law violations. When you walk against a red light, the fact may be announced for all citizens within the block to hear. Third, there are courts that aren't lenient. Crisped 10,000 acres in the Klamath county area remained under control. Lightning storms in many forested districts, however, contributed added dangers to dry, explosive conditions.
