

HEART ATTACK AS PAIR TRY ESCAPE KILLS U.S. MARSHAL

Tacoma, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Dr. Frank R. Maddison said today an autopsy had disclosed United States Marshal A. J. Chitty "died of an acute coronary occlusion, or clot in the heart, following an altercation."

Chitty died late yesterday after two manacled bank robbers, inmates of McNeil Island Federal Penitentiary attacked him in the federal building.

The assailants were Paul Cretzer, 28, listed a year ago by the federal bureau of investigation as "public enemy No. 5," and Arnold Kyle, 29, his brother-in-law. Both were under 25-year sentences for a Los Angeles bank robbery. Federal officers had branded them "the nation's No. 1 bank robbing team."

They were in the federal building for trial on a charge of attempted escape. They fled under fire last April 11 through a gate of the federal prison, but were captured 77 hours later, weary and hungry, on the island.

After the death of Chitty, they promptly changed their pleas to "guilty" and were sentenced by Judge Leon Yankwich of Los Angeles to five years in prison, to follow expiration of their current terms.

After Chitty's death, Vargo said Kyle, shaken visibly, begged: "Shoot me."

New York, Aug. 23.—(AP)—After five consecutive rising sessions, stocks generally dipped their colors to profit takers in today's market.

The list softened a bit at the start, retreated further around midday, recovered for a while, and touched low levels of the day in the final hour when losses for steels, motors and other leaders ranged from 1 to 3 points or so.

The market was exceptionally "thin" throughout with fluctuations of major fractions between sales frequent. Douglas Aircraft made its first appearance on the ticker tape at 2:00 o'clock with a 2-point decline, and several pivots never did sell.

Transfers for the full proceedings were in the neighborhood of 300,000 shares against 420,000 the day before.

RAIDER REPORTED OFF NEW ZEALAND

Wellington, N. Z., Aug. 23.—(AP)—The 8,706-ton British steamer Turakina sent a radio from the Tasman sea Tuesday night saying she was being fired on by a raider, Prime Minister Peter Fraser of New Zealand announced today.

This was the first report of an attack on a British ship in Australian waters.

The message gave the ship's position but no later advice has been received from the vessel, which was due at a New Zealand port last night.

All possible steps were taken immediately by New Zealand naval and air forces to deal with the reported raider, the prime minister said.

MISSING FIANCE HELD A SUICIDE

Pendleton, Ore., Aug. 23.—(AP)—The body of Raymond Jasper Myers, 26, who disappeared Saturday, the day before his wedding, was found today near the Umatilla river.

Coroner Allen Folsom and C. C. Probstel, deputy district attorney, said he committed suicide with a .22 calibre rifle taken from Greenacres dairy where he was employed.

Authorities said no motive had been learned. The young man applied for the license August 15, to marry a Stanfield girl and was to have obtained the certificates Saturday.
