Mrs. Johnny Van Ryn, of Austin, Tex., and Dorothy Bundy, of Santa Monica, Calif., about the same time became the first unseeded women's team in history to gain this tourney's final round by crushing Mary Hardwick and Valerie Scott, the British Wightman cup stars, 6-3, 8-7.

FELLER FADES AS NO-HITTER NEARS; YANKS WIN AGAIN

New York, Aug. 24.—(P)—Bobby Feller couldn't carry the weight of a no-hitter against the Yankees in the stretch today.

For 7 1-3 innings, he hurled a no-hit game at the world champions, as a crowd of 50,964 gasped. Only five men stood between him and his second such classic of the year. Then he faded, and before it was over the Yanks pulled a 3 to 2 victory for a clean sweep of the series.

Thus Bobby, who was shooting at a record no American league hurler has ever posted—two no-hitters in one season—wound up instead with his seventh loss of the campaign against 22 wins.

The setback sliced the Tribe's American league lead to 3 1/2 games over the Detroit Tigers and boosted the Yanks to within six games of the Indians.

TERROR TO REIGN AT ARMORY WHEN PETE MEETS MIKE

All the dirty stuff will occur in the main event, for the two supplementing matches are earmarked for clean exhibitions between evenly matched and clever matmen.

Klamath Falls' Ernie Piluso, who lost to Nazarian last week, will take on Popular Otis Clingman in the six-round center bout, and Bobby Wagner will face Jack Hagen in the opener, also slated for six heats.
