IL DUCE U-BOATS IN ATLANTIC SINK BRITISH TANKER

Rome Editor Warns New Surprise Coming—Minor Victories Told.

Rome, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Italian submarines operating in the Atlantic have torpedoed and damaged a large British oil tanker, the Italian high command reported today.

British air raids on Italian positions in East Africa were said to have killed eight colonists and wounded about 40 persons at Gallabat, injured several civilians at Mogadisco and wounded 15 Askari troops at Combolcia.

The fascist high command's communique yesterday reported a new attack by British naval forces on the port of Bardia, an air raid on Tobruk, another Libyan port, and an Italian bombing attack on British motorized forces between the border and Sidi Barrani, Egypt, in which three armored cars were said to have been destroyed.

The two destroyers which undertook the attack on Bardia Saturday night were driven off by bombing planes, the high command said, while the Tobruk raid caused "extremely small" damage and wounded five persons.

While Virginia Gayda, authoritative editor writing in La Voce D'Italia, warned Britain in obscure terms of "some new surprise" she will have to face in "not many more days," authorities reported the latest British direct attack on Italy had caused little damage.

Bombing planes which attacked Piedmont and Ombardy, in the north, on Saturday night were said to have dropped very few bombs, which killed two persons. The planes were reported put to flight by Italian fighters.

The Swiss government filed a new and "energetic" protest at London against the British raiders' violation of Swiss territory.

Fascist officials declined comment on reports from abroad that Italy is massing troops on the Greek frontier in order to enforce territorial demands in behalf of Italian-annex Albania. Italian-Greek tension remained high.

SUICIDE SCOUTED BY WRITER'S MATE

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 26.—(AP) Mrs. Anne Françoise Cox, widow of Melville James Cox, Reuter's Tokyo correspondent who died after a fall from the second story of the Tokyo gendarmery headquarters here last month, passed through late today en route to London with her husband's ashes.

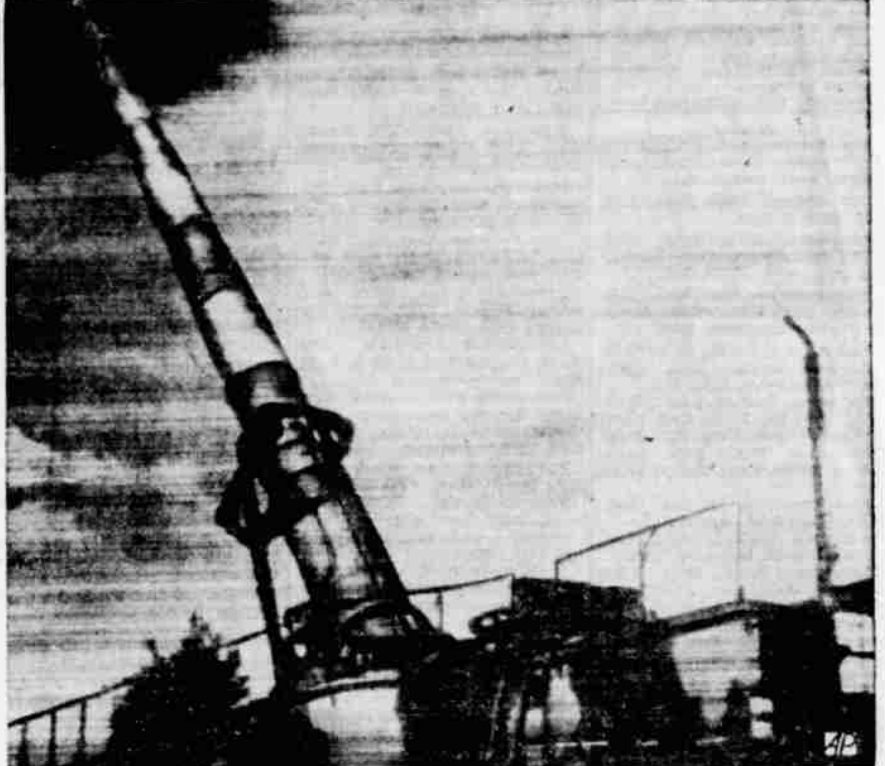
"I have nothing to say at present," she told newspapermen. "I still am in a daze. Only one thing I wish emphatically to say: I do not respect the suicide theory in respect to my husband's death."

Mrs. Cox, a Belgian, was married to Mr. Cox in Japan four years ago. She speaks Japanese fluently.

Cox, arrested by the Japanese on July 27, was taken to the gendarmery headquarters for "military reasons." Authorities claimed he leaped from a window.

NO BAD FAITH BY EMPLOYERS SHOWN

Eugene, Ore., Aug. 26.—(AP)—There has been no bad faith in the waterfront employers' association's negotiations for a new contract with the CIO International Longshoremen's and warehousemen's union, Arbitrator Wayne L. Morse ruled Saturday.

Delays in collective bargaining have been no more the fault of the employers than of the unions, Morse declared.

"The union failed to sustain its burden of proof in support of its charges that the employers have acted in bad faith," he added.

The union accused the association of violating the extension agreement of September 28, 1939, which provided that the parties should resume negotiations in good faith with the maritime labor board as mediator.

Washington, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Representative George N. Seger (R-N.J.), member of congress since 1923 and dean of the New Jersey delegation, died today in naval hospital. He was 74.

A representative Seger, suffered a heart attack Thursday and went to the hospital for a checkup and rest. Another heart attack today was fatal.

Seger had planned to retire at the end of this session of congress. He was the 27th member of this congress to die in office.

In congress, Seger was an advocate of tariff protection and anti-lynching legislation and an opponent of President Roosevelt's supreme court and government reorganization bills.
